
Che Story Mooncoin

For me the name Mooncoin has a magic ring. I always associate the area and Club with great players and great deeds. 

FOREWORD

*

The aim of this publication is to 'record the efforts, irrespective of success, of those who have donned The Mooncoin Colours during the last one hundred years'. Though human the temptation to emphasise the highlights and ignore the troughs is resisted — the successful have already written their story — often in gold and do not await today's pen. The unsuccessful carried the colours with little acclaim and though contributing to the National Aims and continuity of our ancient past-time are long since forgotten. Recalling the less successful efforts down the years is not helpful by the virtual neglect or indeed absence of records from official and reporting sources.

However, here we attempt, where possible, to record the names (Mooncoin, win or lose, always given first) of the Championship Players who kept the flag and Club Colours flying. Since on the field they played an opposing team — real, not phantom — their names are likewise given after Mooncoin's. Half-Time Scores, for more immediate's enlightenment, wherever available, are bracketed after the final score. In the main, Championship Games are pursued — chasing others, Tournament and Challenge, would prove too timeconsuming and very often fruitless.

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HURLING IN BYGONE DAYS

Our ancient manuscripts tell us that four thousand years ago a great nine-a-side hurling match preceded the battle of Mag Tuirid Conga (now Moytura near Cong, Co. Mayo) in which the Tuatha De Danann defeated the Firbolgs. Later the inaugeration of Aonach Tailteann which included hurling in its activities along with athletics and racing continued down to the last High King of Ireland - Roderick O'Connor.

Two thousand years after Moytura, the youthful Cuchulainn shortened his journey with hurley and ball as, alone he crossed Slievefuad, perfecting his skills for later feats and prompting our 'Slievenamon' to write -

Sounding their corded harps, the bard of old Sang of Cuchulainn's prowess when he struck With swift caman the whirling ball in air And met it ere it fell, whipping it back To meet it as before. And too, they tell Of the great Fenians meeting on the plain In mimic warfare when the hurleys clashed And Dhiarmuid O'Doon showed wondrous skill With ringing blows forcing the stubborn goal While thousands cheered him on —

Hereabouts - legend has it for us that back in the mists of antiquity when the people of South Kilkenny assembled at Sliabh O gCruinn (now Tory Hill) to offer sacrifice and pay homage to their Pagan Gods and Tribal King part of the festivities was a hurling contest between the "Durnauns" or the people from the river flats reputedly the best salmon-fishermen in all the land and their opponents - the Mountainy Men. They played fifty men aside and before they lined up on the great meadow at the foot of the hill each man cut himself a hurley in the woods of hollytree abounding the slopes. As the game wore on, one young athlete, to slake his thirst, sought a drink from an old woman living nearby. She told him to pull a tuft of rushes and a spring would appear. He did as she bid and the water came and came and inundated the whole meadow turning the players into pike and trout and so that afternoon Lough Cuillinn (Holly Lake) was born. The significance of the legend is that hurling was common here before the very naming of the lough.

Needless to say hurling was a popular pastime in ancient Ireland and to many young men formed an integral part of their lives. The Normal Invader accepted it once he had begun to feel secure in his possessions - supported and even allowed his men to participate. However such notions were due for a rude challenge in the Statutes of Kilkenny 1366/7, part of the relevant edict being -'It is ordained and established that the Commons (English) of the said lands of Ireland, who are in divers marches and war, use not henceforth the games which men call hurling with great sticks and ball along the ground, but that they apply and accustom themselves to use and draw bows and throw lances, and other gentle games, which appertain to arms whereby the Irish enemies may be better checked by the liege commons of these parts".

The ban effected little - hurling continued to be played by landlord and worker. We find reference to the game in the Caoine or Lament of Walter the Eigha Bernoch, Lord of the Walsh Mountains written by his daughter - dealing with their hunting trips from their home base at Castlehowel (now Rossenara) along the Luingawn above Piltown down to the Suir -

They used to let loose their dogs
in Coill-a-Corrawn
Themselves used to go airing along
the Luingawn
They used to pass home by
the Bog of Pycawn
The bog of the ball, of the broken Camawn
(Lit. where they broke the comawn).

In 1650 — Cromwell decimated the Walshes of the Mountain.

Nearer home — Thomas Ua hUallacain - the last wandering Gaelic Bard of Iverk - wrote some verse in Irish (Oct. 1747) eulogising the virtues of Robert Elliot, landlord of Clonmore, which in part said —

And oft on the green would he engage in hurling sport,
Quick impelling the restless ball to the disputed goal.
(Translation from Irish by Tomas Ua Tuatail - Apr. 1860).

This was certainly the period of greatest threat to the survival of hurling, that is, during the dark Penal Days. It was forbidden by law to cut a tree-branch or even a sapling - which made hurling difficult - generally the game came to be played at the pleasure and behest of the landlord, particularly if he was big and resident. Mooncoin was "fortunate" in so far as most of its landlords were small - middlemen of one or two townlands and often absentee. They cared not a straw what game you played as long as you coughed up your rent on time. Furthermore the area contained many large agricultural villages - Polirone, Ballytarsney, Dournane, Ballygorey, Lickettstown, Rathkieran, Arderra, Clogga, Grange and Clonmore '- each quite capable of putting twenty young men on the field so that their own intervillage rivalry was in itself; if not ideal, at least sufficient to hold interest and keep the game alive.

Apart from this theorizing we know that the site on which Fr. N. Carroll built the P.P.s residence c 1820 was the famous "Carroll's Green or Faitce" well known "from time immemorial and immortalised - In song and story for its great players and outstanding athletes as was stated at the time. The site until shortly before had been commonage - so could have seen hurlers for a thousand years - in fact the Durnauns could have practiced there before they went off to Sliabh O gCruinn to learn to swim. The site had become unsuitable for hurling of late because of encroachment by house-builders.

The above Fr. Nicholas Carroll was a courageous man who fearlessly championed the cause of the oppressed, was a great supporter of Daniel O'Connell and presided over many of his 'Meetings'.

IRISH NATIONAL LEAGUE

1884

Mooncoin Branch

Feb. Irish National League - Branch formed at Mooncoin and the following committee was selected by ballot for the ensuing year:Messrs J.P. Fielding, Pres; P. Carroll, Treas; T. Walsh, Sec; J. Foley, T. Bowers, M. Quinn, J. Halloran, J. Dunphy, M. McDonald.

Resolution:- As a preliminary meeting preparatory to a county convention, it behoves the true men in every parish to take action and

form a branch immediately.

Apr. 13th. Mooncoin National League Branch. Delegates were selected to attend the convention at Kilkenny on 17th inst. and the following Resolution was unanimously adopted - Resolved, that as landlordism is the primary cause of all our grievances, and as we are fully convinced that during its existence there can be no peace or prosperity in this country, we hereby pledge ourselves to give encouragement to, and to hold aloof from such landlord institutions as foxhunts, cattle shows, and all exhibitions and mockeries which tend to debase our people and uphold the prestige and influence of feudalism".

Apr. Fishery Meeting at Carrigeen. Fishermen of the three rivers, the Suir, Barrow and Nore perceived the importance of agitating for removal of grievances, that is restrictions, whereby industry so skillfully carried on in our rivers is damaged. Hundreds earn a living by this avocation which, but for the shortness of the season and absurd prohibition of Saturday fishing, would be a great source of revenue to many a farmer's son. Mr M.A. Manning at the invitation of fishermen and Messrs Jas Farrell and Bowers, representatives of the district on the Fishery Board, presided and explained its objects to the large meeting of at least 2,000 fishermen.

1886 MOONCOIN G.A.A. CLUB FORMED

Jan. - Mooncoin G.A.A. Club formed at which the following officers elected:-

President - Rd (Dick) Dunphy married to Miss Lynagh (now Crowleys) whom he predeceased - noted meticulous farmer with social conscience - provided much employment for married women of Mooncoin Village in difficult times. Further when building retaining wall on river bank incorporated stone seats for the many fishermen then. He was closely related to Bp Dollard - first ever Bp of New Brunswick Canada.

V.Pres. - John Walsh (Psc.) Jack na Cullya, Miller and farmer was an outstanding all-round athlete of whom Monsignor J.P. Dollard wrote - "I believe Jack na Cullya (of the woods) Walsh, was the most renowned athlete Mooncoin ever had. He was very tall and powerful with a form of great comeliness and the head and face of a young Greek God. He made a world's record - throwing

the 56 lbs weight. I think his record 'for the British Isles' for throwing the 56 lbs weight for height still stands. We, young lads, followed him around admiring his strength and beauty. Going down the Quay of Waterford strangers would turn round to gaze after him, yet he was always as gentle and unassuming as possible (see - Parish of Mooncoin p.25 - Rev. Walter Canon McDonald PP).

Sec. - Pat Fogarty (M) Assistant Teacher (1881-91) Mooncoin Nat. Boys Sch. of which Pat O'Neill - Principal. Both were untiring and enthusiastic promoters of our ancient game and an inspiration for some of our later greats. Pat Fogarty favoured the hurling code, - his brother Michael was a strong footballer.

Treas. - James Comerford, Publican, Mooncoin Cross - the fifth of nine generations of Comerfords on the Cross.

John Quinn (D) Capt. hurling. Eldest of many brothers who gave invaluable service to the G.A.A. in its beginnings.

Wm. Carroll (P) Capt. football. Youngest of a large family many of whom later emigrated to New York.

FOOTBALL

1886 A VERY BRIEF ENCOUNTER

Feb. 22nd. In very wet weather a football match was kicked between Mooncoin and Kilmacow for private stakes amounting, it is said to £5. After eight minutes play the Mooncoin men per John O'Keeffe kicked a goal, and were declared the victors.

GAME AT SILVERSPRING

Apr. 18th. Silverspring Mooncoin. In a football match Mooncoin v Piltown the teams comprised 25 players each side - the result was that after half an hour's hard kicking Piltown refused to continue playing because of encroachment onto the pitch. Before 2 o'clock the scheduled starting time, vast crowds of people might have been seen coming from all directions towards the field, the one under the house, kindly lent for the occasion by Edward (Ned) Bowers (Esq). His son, Arthur, made the same field

available afterward in his time. Large crowds continued to flow in from all the surrounding districts up till half past three when the crowd had grown to over 3,000 people. Among the spectators (writes the K. Jour reporter) I noticed several prominent gentlemen from Carrick-on-Suir and the City of Waterford. Mr P.J. Kennedy was on the grounds but he took no active part in Amongst those who took an active part in the management of the affairs were -Messrs Bowers (senior and junior) Ssp.; T. Bowers. Graigavine and Jas Comerford (M). beautiful weather aided not a little in bringing to the field some hundreds of the fair sex. following young ladies whose names I obtained from a friend, were amongst the fair ones who attracted particular notice and are worthy of special mention here:-The Misses Walsh. Portnascully, the Misses Mullins, Rathkieran; Miss Kerr, the Misses McRoe, Silverspring and Miss Brennan, Knockanure. At four o'clock the field was partially cleared and at a quarter past four the kick off was given, but immediately afterwards the spectators in their eagerness to better see the play, rushed in on the grounds from which it was utterly impossible to get them Notwithstanding all this the kicking went on with unabated vigour, the natives (Mooncoiners) never allowing the leather to enter on their territory. for half an hour, when the play resulted as above stated. It is fair to say that it was indeed rather difficult to kick owing to the density of the people on the grounds, but, calling to mind the old saying "what's sauce for the goose is sauce for the gander", the excuse put forth by the visitors (Piltown) for their declining to play out the match was considered a very lame one indeed.

WRESTLING

Soon after the kicking was given up a ring was formed, and a young man named Hogan, the visitors champion, challenged any man in the field to wrestle him. He was not kept long waiting, a young man named McDonnell, stepped into the ring and very soon both were in holds. After a long tussle both came to the ground at the same time, with no decided victory for either, It being what was termed a "dogs fall". They did not, however, attempt it again, but others followed, and wrestling was kept up till seven o'clock, when the vast assembly quietly dispersed.

IRISH NATIONAL LEAGUE

Mooncoin Branch Meeting

May. The chair was occupied by Very Rev. Canon Dunphy P.P. Full attendance of members to whom cards were issued and subscriptions received for current year. The following resolutions were adopted -

'That at this our first meeting since the introduction of the Home Rule and Land Bills we feel bound to tender Mr Gladstone our heartfelt thanks for recognising the right of the Irish people to legislate for themselves and congratulate him on the noble strength and courage he has proved himself possessed of...

That while regarding the principle of the Home Rule Bill as satisfactory and worthy of acceptance we cannot refrain from warning our representatives against allowing the farmers of Ireland being saddled with such a burden as would keep them in the crippled state they are in for the next fifty years'. "That we consider the landlords entitled to nothing more than the market value for their interest and protest against their being treated with exceptional generosity at the expense of the Tenants to whom they were generous only in the distribution of writs, process-ejectments and attorneys' letters".

Carrigeen Branch Meeting - meanwhile with Mr. J. F. Fielding in the chair - among the resolutions adopted were the following:-

"That we tender Mr Gladstone our sincere thanks for his noble efforts to restore to our poor country the inestimable blessings of self-government; and trust he will succeed in getting his bill so amended as to make it more acceptable to Mr Parnell and his followers the true representatives of the Irish Nation".

That we renew our confidence in the integrity, ability and foresight of Mr Parnell and the Irish Party; and that we return our thanks to our county members, Messrs Marum and Chance, for their constant attendance in Parliament during the present session".



action closely could come to no other conclusion but that he did not possess that independent impartiality that is expected from a person honoured with the responsible post of referee. When the 2nd half hours play had expired, one of the field umpires, after conferring with the timekeeper announced to the players that the time was up. This meant that the match was over, and the majority of the Ballyhale Team, in consequence, ceased playing, and then the Mooncoin men had no idfficulty in sending the ball home. Ballyhales, of course, naturally objected to have this - what they considered as an illegal goal recorded against them but Mr Fisher argued and insisted that the time was not up, that a minute had to expire, that the goal was good, and that he would give the credit of it to the Mooncoin Team. Now, Sir, with all respect for Mr Fisher, I assert that his opinion on this question of time was uncalled for, and that he should not interfere. My idea of a referee's duties is that he should reserve his opinion, until those appointed to decide or judge would differ. No such occasion arose on the point I am referring to, and therefore Lagain assert that in obtruding his judgement on a matter that, in legal phraseology did not come before his court, he displayed a partiality that should ever again disqualify him for holding such a responsible position. In making these remarks it must be understood that I do not cast any blame on the Mooncoin men, who, I am certain wanted nothing but a fair field and no favour. I may add I was delighted that the meeting on the whole was such an unqualified success. Apoligising for trespassing on your valuable space.

He, however, quickly recovered and was removed to Surgeon Major Magee's residence, and carefully attended to. He was able to proceed home in the evening.

After this match the 3rd R. of the Football Ch. - Mooncoin v Thomas Larkins was due to be played but Mooncoin had to catch the train so they had to forfeit. Mooncoin footballers later played Kilmacow in a challenge for a barrel of beer and beat them.

All roads led to Portlaoighis lune 15th. Ithen Maryborough) - we are told a revival of the old Gaelic spirit was abroad in South Kilkenny that spirit which prompted their forefathers to display their strength of sinew and litheness of timb on the green sward before the whole countryside. In manly prowess and activity the present exponents bear comparison with heroes of other older days. A special excursion train from Waterford arrived Portlaoighis with its 1200 passengers at 2.00pm whence all proceeded to the spacious playing field, half a mile outside the town. Arrangements under the local G.A.A. were The members picturesquely constumed maintained good order and clear boundaries. Mooncoin and Kilmacow were both representing the County in their respective codes. Kilkenny opposed to Laoighis meant Mooncoin Rathdowney. Mooncoin won the toss and opened the game at a hectic pace which was answered in full measure by their opponents "The Downies". This made for a thrilling spectable of a field in motion and everyone involved in the spirit of the occasion right up to the last moment. Before the vast concourse of some ten thousand Gaels the Mooncoiners displayed their usual skill but it soon became evident they required it all and the game would be close - it required a discriminating eye to adjudge the superior. The Downies showed unexpected expertise and astonishing swiftness but not quite as sure. However, from sustained pressure on their goal the Downies broke away speedily and scored a point. A squabble between two of the combatants arrested play for some time resulting in a Rathdowney man, Doherty, being expelled. This excited the Mooncoiners to greater effort and straining eye and limb they lifted themselves to greater heights. After some beautiful play in which they supported one another in a way that excited salvoes of applause

they scored a point. After half time the Mooncoin men surpassed themselves. Their magnificient swiping and the manner in which they contrived to render mutual assistance bore down all opposition and generated feverish excitement when a goal was scored from the irressistible Rathdowney - now equally excited with energy renewed - proved no unworthy opponents to Mooncoin and after tremendous exertion scored another point. As the end of the match was reached the players evinced great earnestness, an effusion of energy - men, hurleys and ball ran. whirled and flew with amazing and confusing rapidity. The Kilmacow men naturally feel aggrieved that they should again be summoned such a distance from home, but in all probability on this occasion their expenses will be paid in accordance with the recommendation of Central Council.

MOONCOIN - CHAMPIONS OF LEINSTER

1888. July 15th. Kilk/Mooncoin 0-7. Dublin-Kickhams 0-3. Another successful trip to Portlaoise for the Mooncoin hurlers who scored a decisive victory over the celebrated 'Dublin Kickhams'. Though confident of success the metropolitan team took their defeat with the utmost good grace. "The Mooncoin men (we are told) are in fact the fathers of the present generation of hurlers in this country. district the game was never allowed to die out and certainly the players that represent it now are about the most skilful in all Ireland. The referee decided that the Mooncoin Hurlers won by seven points (0-7) to three (0-3). Now in the first place this score gives no actual idea of the relative merits of the team and secondly it is not an absolutely

correct record of what took place - as without doubt one of the points credited to the Mooncoin men should have been registered a goal". (Wat/News). On the following day the Freeman Journal wrote "Mooncoin are now champions of Leinster and they richly deserve it as it would be hard to find better wielders of the caman, and are worthy candidates for the All-Ireland title.

The winners, Mooncoin are now champions of Leinster for the present year and have qualified to meet Clonoulty (Tipp.) in the All-Ireland Final.

The game was skilful -Wexford, very fast and agile were very deft with their hands to which Kilmacow drew the referee's attention and objected mainly on the grounds of insufficient 'football' content. Kilmacow played their customary, sturdy, dashing with their magnificent long punting - always a feature. Jack Laffan and Wm Kenneally both Kilmacow players got hurt in the first few minutes but the Wexford captain refused to allow replacements. the Kilmacow goalie, gave a brilliant display and though repeatedly peppered kept a safe goal, Kilmacow won the Leinster Football Title to go with Mooncoin's Hurling Leinster Title.

All went well until the procession passed the grabbers house when a dozen police concealed, rushed out, grabbed two young men for shouting and did their utmost to create a row marched on to the residence of Fr. Purcell P.P. who came out - made a stirring speech, telling them it gladdens him to see the spirit of Nationality existed so strong in them. He spoke then of Tom Moroney and ended by calling for three cheers for Tom that would shake the Comeragh Mountains. The police did not venture past the gate leading to the priest's residence as they were very long taking down the names of all who passedin the gateway.

The Young Irelanders of Carrick arrived brimful of success and with their band blaring, through the village and onto the field. The game was a truly magnificent one - active, skilful and determined. The rivals gave a masterly exposition of football as it should be played under the rules of the G.A.A. and although fortune rewarded the efforts of the gallant Commercials their victory was a desperately hard-earned one.

Ballyhenneberry and Mullinavat then took the field in a third football match but it was plain from the start that the ball was a minor consideration in (Neither Championship - Hurling or Football got beyond the Provincial Finals in 1888 because of what came to be termed the "American Invasion" - a Tour of the States by some fifty athletes and officials).

The following lines were penned some forty years later in tribute to the above remarkable Kilmacow Football Team - winners of the first Leinster Football Title, to the air - 'Dear Old Grannail'.:-

THE MEN OF KILMACOW

All ye that love our Irish sport draw near, both young and old,

And listen with attention to these lines I now unfold.

Concerning those young heroes, the flower of Leinster now,

The men of fame whom I do name are the Team from Kilmacow.

In features they are handsome, in stature fine and tall,

There is no club can equal them in prowess at football.

The Arab steed has no such speed, they are like the men of old,

They are both strong and active, courageous, stout and bold.

It was on the plains of Piltown, in the springtime of the year,

Their deeds of valour first began, as you shall quickly hear,

They won that day with colours gay, though the wind it harshly blew,

And point and goals sailed through the poles in spite of brave Slieverue.

And next they conquered famed Mooncoin, though they boasted long and loud,

And the beating they would give to them they had all described in song,

But their haughty verse was the reverse, as we have plainly seen,

For they fell that day like Autumn leaves before the gold and green.

The Callan men they tackled then, and their flag they did pull down,

And twice they nobly brought the sway

down from Kilkenny Town, Outside the bounds of Dublin, in ancient Clonasksa,

The champions of the Co. Louth they defeated there that day.

Those gallant clubs they did defeat, and always took the lead,

Far famed throughout old Ireland for courage, strength and speed,

Though opposing Teams would all fight hard their serried ranks would fail,

They beat the boys of Wexford, Glenmore and Ballyhale.

Twas pleasant to see how nobly for a contest they'd prepare,

In honour of their native place, and the colours they did wear,

With spirits eager for the fray, their like is seldom seen,

Those one and twenty heroes in their garb of gold and green.

Englishmen may proudly pen their victories side by side,

The Romans, too, who did subdue famed nations far and wide,

On many a land they took their stand, their ships the seas did plough,

But they have no share that can compare with the men of Kilmacow.

Bessborough remained on the ground during the match and enjoyed it mightily - He publicly expressed his thanks to the Mooncoin men for the pleasure they had so kindly afforded him.

Mr Pat Fogarty, who refereed the three matches, considering the attending circumstances got very well through a most difficult task - general sideline disturbances notwithstanding. By mutual the hurling match between Ballyhenneberry and Piltown was deferred whilst the fifth match - cancelled. The reports fulminated against the behaviour and castigates the promoters for inadequate policeing but in the process throws some light on the practice prior to that period. We must oppose the "prostitution of sport for trade purposes Those who see in the promotion of Gaelic sports a means to a money making end. Some time since - publicans' Tournaments flourished in the country. were almost a recognised institution amongst certain members of the Trade and for a time football and high revels went hand in hand "The Most Rev. Dr. Croke knew that many "grand football Tournaments" were got up to induce the people to have a grand spree, and he determined to do what in him lay to stamp out practices which were degrading to the Irish nature.

Accordingly the Archbishop wrote to the Thurles Convention of 1888 urging the adoption of the following conditions:

(1) Sale of alcoholic drink in or near sports venue be prohibited.

(2) In selecting playing locality neighbourhood of public-houses be avoided.

(3) No prizes be accepted from publican - when offered to attract custom.

Accepted as cardinal rules for guidance of the G.A.A.

As stated the Mooncoin Committee was held responsible for not controlling the 'expected' rowdyism rampant at last Sunday Tournament to which Tom Bower an able organiser, Co. Delegate for the John Dillons, replied for the Tournament Committee.

Dear Sir,

With most of your remarks every true Gae! must agree. It is certainly a mistake to hold Tournaments so near pub-houses and it is a burning shame for Irishmen, who meet either to play or to witness the game, to indulge in such rowdyism, as was indulged in on that occasion. Mooncoin was not the first to make the mistake of holding a Tournament close to public houses; as a rule most Tournaments are not held very far from one, but I am requested to state, and I am happy to be able to say from my own knowledge, that the Mooncoin people are in no way to blame. Committee did all in their power to give the Teams they invited a clear field and it must be admitted in this they succeeded pretty well, and again a single man from Mooncoin did not in any way In many contribute to these disorderly scenes. cases where they did interfere to stop a row, they were assaulted and did not even retaliate fearing it might be said, a man from the parish ill-treated Mooncoin men themselves were not a stranger. dealt with so when invited lately to a strange parish to play a friendly match, and got stones and dirt thrown in their faces (not I must say by the opposite players) but by outside sympathisers for no reason but that they had the best of the play. I merely wish to mention the above facts with regard to the Mooncoin Tournament for it would appear from the report, which I am sure was not meant, that Mooncoin men were as deeply implicated in the rows as anyone else, nothing being said to the contrary. However it is high time that such conduct should be put an end to and all true Gaels should see that order and decency should reign at such gatherings, so that the Association may attain the ends for which it was formed, namely, to unite more closely in the bonds of brotherhood and friendship the Irish people, through the medium of these old and noble pastimes.

1889 IRISH NATIONAL LEAGUE MONSTER MEETING AT KILANASPIG

Apr. A most successful meeting, if attendance be the measure. The Mayor of Waterford arrived at ten minutes to two o clock and immediately following the car on which he sat - came wagonettes containing the members of the patriotic Working Mens Club and of the John Mitchell Fife and Drum Band. From the four points of the compass - cars, horsemen, Gaels dressed in uniform, the John Dillon Volunteers prominent amongst them and pedestrians moved to the place assigned for the gathering - a hollow, nestling at the base of four hills, from which was kept, by trustworthy scouts, a sharp lookout. During the hour and a half the meeting held, the enemy were completely oblivious of the fact wholesale sedition, vide Government proclamations, was being preached to a most enthusiastic, orderly and attentive gathering, which certainly numbered many thousands.

On the motion of the Mayor of Wat. seconded by Fr. Dillon, the chair was taken by Rev. Canon Dunphy P.P. Mooncoin, who said they had assembled to sympathise with the widow and orphan the evicted and not as the proclamation stated, for the purpose of promoting a criminal conspiracy. Among the other speakers at this 'suppressed' I.N.L. meeting were of course the Mayor of Waterford, Rev. Fr. Downey, Mvat.; Mr M.A. Manning, Wat.; strong in their condemnation of land-grabbers, grass-grabbers, emergency men and those who aid evictions, directly or indirectly. They pledged wholehearted support for Mr Parnell and his men in their efforts. Mr L. Power, Carrigeen, proposed a vote of thanks to Canon Dunphy for presiding seconded by Mr J. Fielding (Psc), (others present -Rev. Fr. Tynan C.C., Rev. Fr. Cahill C.C., Rev.

Fr. Timothy C.C., Mooncoin, Rev. Fr. Walsh C.C., Rev. Fr. Downey, C.C. Mvat., M. A. Manning, Wat., E. Phelan T.C. do., J.P. Kennedy, do., J. Green, J. Caulfield, do., P. Keeffe, Kcow., J. Keeffe, do., H. Matthews, do., E. Walsh, do., J. Farrell, do., D. Gleeson, P.L.G., Ballyshonuck, L. Power, Carr., J. Fielding Psc., T. Bowers, Gvine., P. Buckley, Kilmacthomas, J. Henneberry, Cc., M. Walsh, Cga., R. Comerford, Kpig., D. Larkin, W.G. Fisher, T.C., C.P. Redmond, Wat. News etc). Proceeding ended, the cars, led by the John Mitchell Band moved towards Piltown. As they neared, about 100 police surrounded a spacious platform (in fact an I.N.L. decoy erected the day before to mystify) with hussars nearby. As the Mayor car approached - "Fix Bayonets and Charge" called the Co. Inspector. Fortunately, the Divisional Comm. nearby countermanded and allowed the procession to pass.

1889 CONFUSION REIGNS

July 6th. The affairs of Kilk, got into such a state of hopeless confusion consequent, it is said, on the neglect of the Co. Sec. that a Convention of the branches of the County was held in Kilkenny to try and put matters to rights. Mr Jas. Grace, Thomastown, was chosen Secretary and a couple of new members were elected on the Co. Council. Mr Grace enquired how much money on hand to which Mr John Mullally Glenmore replied - 'not a penny'.

Merely one aspect of the disruption and malaise overtaking the Association; partly consequent to the 'American Invasion of '88' when interest waned and realism grew. However, for the next eight years '89 to '97, in the country side hurling lay dormant, because of the political unrest, land agitation, evictions, boycotting, land-grabbing, proclamations, suppression of gatherings, creating a state of nervous tension and exhaustion in the people. Those with any land scarcely slept but if they did they kept their eyes open.

1890 TENANTS DEFENCE ASSOCIATION

Feb. Subscriptions to the Tenants Defence Association, have, as a rule, been paid with the greatest readiness. However, there are exceptions. At an I.N.L. meeting - Canon Dunphy in the chair and present - Rev. Fr. Keehan, Messrs. A. Conway, K. Brennan, T. Bowers and A. Moran - it was

decided to publish names of subscriber to the Ten. Def. Ass. and the following were appointed to arrange for the completion of the collection. - Kilanaspig - Messrs Farrell, Brennan, Conway. Mooncoin - Messrs Bowers, Murphy and Oakey. Carrigeen - Messrs Walsh, Madden and Moran.

Question Posed

Mar. A Dublin writer poses the question - "Are the world-famed Kilmacow Footballers and the Mooncoin Hurlers dead and buried" - They are alive and kicking (says the Wat/N. reporter) but the heart was fairly knocked out of them by the treatment which they got a couple of years ago by the Central Council. Perhaps under happier auspices they may again be induced to take the field. Mooncoin from the start, objected to Kilkenny city as venue - both travelling times and expenses for them disproportionate - players who couldn't afford one or other or both became ineligible for selection and lost to the game.

Kilmacow, a fantastic team and club, winners of the very first Leinster Football Title disappeared for good from the scene and from which Kilkenny football failed to recover.

Mar. - Gaels in disarray - G.A.A. members should work with the Nat. League - Clubs not to allow aiders or abettors of emergency men or grabbers, or fraternisers with the police to participate in Gaelic games.

After the break, Mooncoin resumed as men inspired, quickened their pace and with sure-fire combination "kept the game dancing in the Middleton territory while taking their scores. Such an exhibition of swift, scientific purposeful caman wielding was scarcely ever seen before on the Shandon grounds contested in the most friendly character" and which concluded:

EXPECTATIONS SHATTERED

The prospect of this renewed meeting generated tremendous interest among Gaels of diverse alliances. However, the many who assembled at the Dungarvan ground were in for a disappointment. It seems all the M. Team left Waterford Station for Dungarvan at 11.30 but when the train got to Kilmeaden it was discovered that five of the team were missing. The only reason forthcoming for the absence was that they were not prepared to loose the medals and pay for them as well. The excuse of the absentees is certainly not a very chivalrous one and is open to question (writes the correspondent). As a matter of fact Mr Fielding told the Mooncoin Club that he would be personally responsible for the medals and this perfecting 'bona fide' understanding was part of the Mooncoin programme as late as Sat. evening - The disappointment was keen indeed and we trust our Co. Kilk friends will not allow themselves to fall out again over Trifles '(Wat. News).

It may be the terms of the challenge was unknown to some of the players before they gathered at Waterford Station who were opposed in principles to any wagering by or on their behalf.

A game of sorts among the players who got to Dungarvan took place - which satisfied no-one.

At a meeting of this branch Mr Pat Henneberry and P. Dalton attended - the former to report that he is in full possession of his farm at Dournane and has already made a good sale of portion of his hay; Dalton to give information regarding his farm grabbed some time since by a man named Gilmartin - The following resolutions were adopted -

1st. "That in view of the good being done and victories gained all over the West of Ireland by the United Irish League, we feel it our duty to call on our fellow-parishioners to fall into line at once and enroll themselves as members."

2nd. "That in order to give them an opportunity of doing so the officers and committee of the branch will hold a meeting at Mooncoin on Sun. Aug. 12th at 2.00 p.m."

3rd. "That we are surprised and disgusted that certain persons who should have some respect for themselves publicly associate themselves with emergency men located in the parish; and we warn these parties that if they continue to do so serious notice must be taken of their conduct."

1901

June 16th. At Ballyhale. S.H.Ch R1 Mooncoin defeated Friars Hall.

Aug. 18th. At Threecastles S.H.Ch. R2. Mooncoin 2-6 (2-3) Tullaroan 2-6 (0-3)

Billed as an epic confrontation - which was expected to be hard and close and so it proved to be. Ideal weather, perfect ground and excellent arrangements plus a very large attendance warranted satisfaction. Referee McCarthy got the game under way at 2.40 p.m. and from the start Mooncoin went on the offensive - pointing to open the scoring - and having had the better of the exchanges in the first half led by a clear two goals at H.T. M. 2-3 to 0-3. The Fielding brothers had had a good first half. John sending a perfect pass to O'Keeffe who shot to the net for the first score, then pointing himself, brother Pat added a goal and a point and O'Keeffe added a point. Jer Doheny (2) and S. Walton (1) scored for Tullaroan.

Tullaroan came back strongly in the second half. Five minutes from thd end, we are told, the Mooncoin captain, according to himself asked the score of the referee who stated the scores were level. Mooncoin scored a point, had a goal disallowed - the game ended, the referee declared a draw. Mooncoin had played "a very fast game from start to finish, and wielded the caman in a style well worthy of the men immortalised by their Poet-Priest Father J.B. Dollard. Needless to say Tullaroan were worthy of their past reputation". Two incidents occurred which may have effected the rules later:

- 1. Sim Walton returned a weak puck-out which struck a spectator and glided in between the point post (which was then outside the goal posts on each side). The score was disallowed.
- 2. John Fielding scored a goal direct from a free but since no-one other than the free-taker had touched the ball the score was disallowed.

The replay generated tremendous interest with large sums of money laid on both teams. Callan had never if ever seen such a gathering. However after Tullaroan had led 3-4 to 0-0 at half time and then - running riot in the second-finished 9-14 to nil. Some questions arise. Reports, at the time wax lyrical on the brilliance and excellent skills of the Tullaroan men and, no doubt, they had some, but cannot conceivably account for the debacle which took place. The teams, after all, had drawn but a month before. Ref. - AB Jim Nowlan.

With reference to the above match at Callan, Mooncoin versus Tullaroan - Mr Edw. Fielding, Rathkieran writes - "Mooncoin were very badly treated by the outsiders during the match. Some of our boys are confined to their beds from the treatment given them by the crowd, who used whips and sticks on them and then left them to the hurlers to follow their example. This is not due to Callan men but to Tullaroan followers, and some very respectable men demeaned themselves by striking Mooncoin players with the butt end of their whips."

Nov. 8th. An Cead Sgoruigeact Muintreac ag Connrad na Gaedilge (Craob Portlairge). Use of Town Hall obtained and then refused so held in Hall of Catholic Young Men's Society, Parnell Street. - Very successful concert in presence of many clergy and V.I.P.s. Mr N. Cantwell, Mooncoin, was one of the great successes of the evening. He sang, in Irish, of course, "For Ireland I'll not tell you who she is" and he rolled off the ballad in a manner which showed that he knew to perfection his theme and its setting. In response to an imperative recall, he came back and sang the last verse again.

1903 TOURNAMENT AT MOONCOIN

Jan. 20th. Gaelic Tournament at Mooncoin. in Jas. Comerford's field, hard by Grange Railway Station - a field which is the most suitable that could be had in the Mooncoin district for a Gaelic display of any description. Well laid out for the occasion and throughout the best order prevailed amongst the vast concourse of spectators and the different teams who came to try conclusions. Part of the subscription from the gate to go towards the funds of forthcoming ploughing match at Mooncoin. Principal object of the Tournament, however, is the recoupment of expenses incurred by that gallant and famous football combination known as the "Slate Quarry Miners" through their visits to other territories to uphold the honour and reputation of their native Co. Kilkenny in the Gaelic Arena.

First Game - Hurling - Mooncoin No. 2 v Ferrybank. Rather one-sided as Mooncoin who proved themselves swifter and more scientific in the use of the caman than their opponents winning three goals and some points to nil.

Second Game was the principal feature - Co. Kilk. Foot. Ch. S.F. Kilmacow v Lamogue. Refereed in impartial manner by Mr J. McCarthy, T.C. Kilk.

Ding-dong battle from start to finish of first half in which both sides notched a point. In the second period of the game Lamogue captured two points to Kilmacow's one making the entire score Lamogue 0-3, Kilmacow 0-2.

After this Mooncoin and Piltown took the field in a hurling contest which had to be terminated after about twenty minutes owing to the lateness of the hour. During that time the home team played for all they were worth and did not give their adversaries a look-in - their score being - M. 1 goal and 5 points to nil for Piltown. Ref. - Mr. J. Neill.

Aug. 14th. Gaelic Tournament at Christendom. Football Waterford 1-5 (0-4), Carlow 0-4 (0-1). Waterford City Drapers were superior in point of science and tact. s

The Hurling match Dublin (Thomas Davis) v Mooncoin was of an exciting and well contested After the throw-in a good stroke near character. half mark sent the ball through the point posts when the white flag was raised indicating that a point had been duly captured - shortly after a second point was recorded for Mooncoin. was fast and scientific and nice bits along the sideline. A fine hit from Butler high over the posts for a third point. Mooncoin hit swiftly along the sideline and R. O'Keeffe drove out the fourth point. At this moment Dublin hustled the ball to within a few yards of the Mooncoin sticks when Quinn saved in splendid style transferring play to midfield; Mooncoin, following well up, put out, amidst the unbounded enthusiasm of their friends - a goal; Kilkenny subsequently, the Co, augmented their score by three points obtained in quick succession. The score at half time:

Mooncoin 1-6, Dublin 0-0.

On resumption Mooncoin opened with a point. A Dublin player got hurt and play ceased until a substitute was provided. Afterwards matters got lively and the Thomas Davis combination for the first time secured a point. Mooncoin defenders again bore down on Dublin sticks and playing in a swift and scientific manner

shot out a goal. Play was of a give and take character when Jack Keeffe of Co. Kilk. came into possession and hit out a straight point. Not many minutes elapsed before Mooncoin again treated the spectators to another magnificent exhibition in which Fielding showed himself to advantage. At one time Robert Keeffe took the ball on the caman at midfield and sent out a point. This was generally pronounced to be the best puck given up to that atage of the game. Mooncoin subsequently had things as they liked and went on scoring points in rapid succession. At the close of the game, in which the Mooncoin caman wielders showed their form of long ago, matters stood at the final

1904

IRISH CONCERT AT MOONCOIN

Ian. 10th. A. Gaelic concert inaugurated by the Rev. Fr. Fielding (Rk) and Rev. Dr. Henebry (Portlaw) took place in the boys school, Mooncoin A large and appreciative audience gathered at 7 o'clock and the concert lasted about four hours, so it will be readily seen that a most enjoyable function took place. The function was held with a view to establishing a branch of the Gaelic League in Mooncoin. Rev. Dr. Henebry delivered an address in Irish and also in English that in Irish probably understood by just a few. During the evening some most excellent selections were reproduced by Fr. Fielding on the gramophone amongst them being reproductions of the Reverend entertainer's own expositions of Irish music on the flute. Another record played by Fr. Fielding during the evening was the song in Irish "The Fairy Boy" capitally sung by Mr. Nicholas Cantwell (M). A splendid exposition of Irish dancing was given by the Ryan-Healy combination from the Walsh Mts. whose prowess is too well known to need mention here. Byrne, the Irish piper, charmed his hearers with the selections which he played for the dances. Master Carroll of Portlaw danced in exceedingly fine style a double and a hornpipe - Mr Padhraig O'Neill of Ring, was in great form, and sung several songs in the old tongue with great spirit. One of the items of the evening was the trio played by Father Henebry (violin) and Messrs. J. Henebry of Portlaw, and J. Byrne (pipes). Two little girls named Power sang very prettily 'The Cruiskeen Lawn". Messrs McDonald, Walsh and Hawe also contributed to the entertainment. The enthusiasm which prevailed augers well for the Gaelic League in Mooncoin. The Rev. Dr. Henebry was the famous Maynooth Professor, associate there of Rev. Dr. Walter McDonald).

James Byrne (1868-1931), one of Ireland's outstanding pipers at the turn of the century was born beside the hill of Tara in Ballybogan, Co. Meath. A gifted flute and fiddle player from youth he, in his late teens, perfected his pipe playing at the Rowsome farm Ballintone, Co. Wexford where Samuel and his three sons, all pipers resided. Jim Byrne taught and played throughout the country and among many honours won first prize at Dublin Feis Ceoil in 1905 and

the Oireachas, 1912. His daughter, Mary, who died last year, was wife of Jim Holden, M. village.

1905 TULLAROAN PIP MOONCOIN

Tullaroan 1-7 (1-3) Mooncoin 2-3 (1-2)

One of the tightest games seen for many a long day was played at the Gaelic field in what was an ordered replay in the Senior Hurling Championship semi-final of 1904. The referee was Mr N. Dalton. From the throw-in Tullaroan were away and within minutes Jer. Doheny had notched a point. Walton, exercising a roving commission between the half-line and the square was giving the Mooncoin backs a headache - he had

two points in quick succession before Mooncoin registered a score - a goal through O'Keeffe. The Tullaroan reply was not long in coming when from a melee in the Mooncoin square the ball went loose for Walton to bury in the net. Jimmy Kelly had a point at the other end for Mooncoin and O'Keeffe added another to leave just a point the difference at H.T. Tullaroan 1-3 Mooncoin 1-2. On resuming Jer Doheny again opened the scoring with a point and Walton added another from a centred '70'. Fielding replied with a point for Mooncoin and Kelly with a rasper hit the upright. Saunders from a very acute angle sent over and Doheny added another. With minutes to go Jimmy Kelly had one of his specialties a lefthanded whipped drop-shot which travelled faster than eye could see so couldn't be stopped and left Mooncoin a point in arrears. Tullaroan, who had got their nose in front at the start and were never headed, now had to fight to withstand a tremendous onslaught by Mooncoin in the last The game had been a titanic struggle for supremacy right through - played tight, hard, but honest with occasional glimpses of scintillating artistry from 'Drug', Quinn and Kelly for Mooncoin while for Tullaroan Jer Doheny, Walton and Teehan excelled. Tullaroan held out and at the final whistle were a point ahead. Tullaroan 1-7 Mooncoin 2-3.


Apr. 25th. at Callan. S.H.Ch. S.F. (1905). Erin's Own 3-7 Mooncoin 0-2

Erin's Own who eventually won the final, had a rather easy win over Mooncoin in the semi-final at Callan. Last season, Mooncoin had also lost in the semi-final to their old rivals - Tullaroan. However, against Erin's Own - the Mooncoin 'stars' failed inexplicable and on the whole played well below form. They were unlucky to lose Pat Fielding, who retired injured almost immediately

after the start and his loss completely disorganised the whole team. Dick Brennan gave the winners a good start and thereafter they never looked back Owing to a dispute the Mooncoin men walked off the field while there was still nine minutes of playing time remaining - and the referee, Mr M.J. Lynch of Callan awarded the match to Erin's Own.

Mooncoin objected to the referee's decision but at a Co. Committee Meeting in the Town Hall on May 13th. - Chairman D.J. Gorey ruled that Mooncoin had no right of appeal, as they had acted contrary to rule 19 which forbade a team leaving the pitch before the termination of the game without the permission of the referee.

(Erin's Own went on to win their first and only S.H. Ch. Final (1905) played on June 1906 at St. James Park, beating Tullaroan 5-6 to 2-8).


HONOURS COME SOUTH

The game, as a consequence, suffered some encroachment of the playing area. However, this tussle of the giants of hurling measured up to everyone's expectations. Mooncoin were slightly favoured due to the absence of the veteran stalwart Tullaroan goalie 'Fox' Maher. However, on the other hand, Mooncoin, playing far from base could count on very little support if any, whereas, Tullaroan, being convenient, would have them in from the hills and the bogs.

Shortly after 3.00 o'clock referee J. McCarthy TC got the game started and in the opening minutes S. Walton and Mick Doyle exchanged It was apparent from the start that the points. pace was going to be fast with the players showing a willingness, keeness and a hunger for the ball. Tullaroan pressed hard and Pat Clohosey pointed from play - back they came and after some resolute defence Jer Doheny, the Tullaroan Captain got through for a great goal, to which he added a point within minutes. This roused Mooncoin forwards and after some deft stickwork and slick combination the elusive Jimmy Kelly slipped through to shake the back of the net. From the puck-out the youthful Dick Grace, playing in his first Co. final picked off an neat point with Jack Keoghan pointing a free before the short whistle. Tull 1-5. M 1-1. After resumption Mooncoin played aggressively and with the Doyles and Kelly combining perfectly the pressure was sustained. At the three quarter mark the sides were level then Tullaroan had a couple of long points, Dick Doyle found Kelly who found the net. point P. Campion the Tullaroan goalie retired injured and was replaced by M. Lennon who played out-field while E. Teehan went back in goal. Walton and Doheny pointed but back came Mooncoin for the old combination to put Kelly through for another goal. Doheny sent one over as the whistle blew time.

Spectators and goal umpires credited Mooncoin with a point win while the referee called it a draw M 3-6 Tull 1-12. So the decision went to the Co. Board which awarded Mooncoin the disputed point and the Co. Title.

Mooncoin's combination, accuracy and precision in manipulating their hurleys on the leather as well as their intense activity throughout the field helped them to build up their score. Mike Doyle with two goals, John Fielding and Jim Kelly with a goal each and J. Kelly with five points against a solitary point scored by Gough (Clonea) for Waterford left the score at the interval M 4-6 Wat. Sel 0-1. resuming J. Kelly and J. Fielding pointed, then Nolan goaled and added a point for Wat. The were Dovle brothers exhibiting brilliant combination play. Mick Keeffe had a point for Mooncoin and before time was called Power scored a couple of points for Wat. F.T. M. 4-13 Wat. Sel. 1-5.

Some other fanciful reasons were also given. A hot controversy took place through the press (Expr) without solving anything. The final letter on the subject on behalf of the Mooncoin Hurling Club is given below - mainly for its historical value as something written by the then Committee.

The Leinster Council suggested the venue be Ballyhale or Knocktopher on appeal by Erin's Own who had stated at Kilk. Co. Board G.A.A. presided over by Denis J. Gorey) - "they thought Carrick neither neutral nor central and refused to play there".

Feb. 29th. Letter from Mooncoin Hurling Club to 'Ned of the Hill' (M/E).


Dear Sir,

good goal and Mike Doyle a couple of points against two points for E.O. per Butcher Brennan. Then Jim Dunphy saved well and cleared in Mooncoin goal - R. Brennan of E.O. got possession and shot a point. The flag steward raised the white flag but an Erin's Own supporter rushed in and raised the red flag - confusion ensued and not alone words but hurleys were used indiscriminately as the crowd's swarmed the pitch. sounded the whistle and the Mooncoin men lined up but Erin's Own refused stating that some of their players were injured in the melee, and left the Jack Fielding, M. capt. approached the referee for his decision which, however, he reserved for the Co. Board. At the time of the game's abrupt conclusion with some minutes left for play Mooncoin led M 1-8 Erin's Own 0-7.

Mooncoin, the reigning champions were expected to do well and immediately referee Dan Stapleton got the game under way Mooncoin pressed hard - eventually rewarded with a goal by Dick Doyle to open the scoring. Then Tullaroan pressed but their efforts countered and so the game went move and countermove from one end to the other. The pace was fast with both defences giving nothing away. Jimmy Kelly picked a loose one and shot over for a point. Keoghan pointed a free from centrefield as did Fielding for Mooncoin. Combination was slick and anticipation uncanny. Doheny passed to Walton who shot between the goal posts. From a melee in front of goal Tullaroan forged another major before H.T. T. 2-1, M. 1-2.

After the interval Tullaroan attacked strongly and Walton pointed to put them a goal in front. Sustaining the offensive Doheny added another point. The pace of the game had increased if anything in the second half. Doherty slipping his man passed to J. Kelly who pointed for Mooncoin's only score in this half. Backs on both sides reigned supreme, however, Tullaroan pointed a couple of long-range frees before F.T. Tullaroan 2-6, Mooncoin 1-3.

A COWARDLY ASSASSIN SHOOTS AT REV. J. K. FIELDING IN CHICAGO CHURCH Diving knocks Culprit down and escapes both bullets.

Chicago 18th. An attempt to assassinate Rev. J.K. Fielding, pastor of Corpus Christi Church (Catholic) was made this afternoon. After twice shooting at the priest in the Sunday School hallway of the Church the assassin knocked down several children that stood in his way, ran into the street and escaped. The priest was not hurt. The shooting and the screaming of the children created wild excitement in one of Chicago's fashionable residence quarters.

The culprit first attracted attention by loitering about the church and writing on a sheet of paper which he held against the building. Made curious by the man's peculiar actions, Fr. Fielding asked him "What are you doing here?" "I'm praying" replied the stranger. - As the priest turned his back the stranger drew a revolver and pressed it against his intended victim. Fr. Fielding immediately knocked the weapon away just in time, to escape a bullet, which grazed his head and clipped a lock of hair from his temple. The priest then knocked the culprit down. Hurriedly scrambling to his feet the man continued down the

hallway pushing and trampling over many children. At the bottom of the stairway he fired another ineffectual shot at the priest and then, still brandishing the revolver, ran down the street. Children and citizens, accompanied by Father Fielding pursued the man, but he escaped. The man is described as being either Greek or Italian.

Corpus Christi Church includes in its membership many of the wealthiest Catholics. Information was obtained by police that led them to believe that the would-be assassin was the same man who, for several days, had been loitering about the Church of Holy Angels and St. Xavier Academy, both of which are situated near Corpus Christi-Church.

Under the conviction that one or more men had entered into a conspiracy to kill Father Fielding and other priests, the police, have placed extra watch over the places with instructions to question all suspicious persons. (Rev. J.K. Fielding's Escape - Munster Express thanks Rev. T.J.Q. for the account. All join in congratulations to such a stalwart and sterling Irishman as the Rev. Father Fielding undoubtedly is.)

Fr. James Kieran Fielding Rk. b.24.4.2870. Attended Mooncoin N.S. Kilmacow College School, St. Kieran's College and completed his studies at St. Mary's Seminary, Baltimore Md. He was ordained June 21st 1899 and took up duties in the parish of St. Justin, Martyr, in Chicago. Aside from sacerdotal duties - he was founder and first president of Gaelic Park - purpose of which was the promotion and championing of Irish games, song and dance in Chicago. He also organised the Irish Language League in 1899. In appreciation of his great work he was elected National Chaplain of the Gaelic League of America State President of the Gaelic League of Illinois and President of the Gaelic Athletic Club of Chicago.

FR. JAMES B. DOLLARD'S VIEWS

My Dear Vigilant,

The letter which I am about to write you this time may surprise you a little. At the outset I wish to disassociate you altogether from the views I am about to give expression to. as I know, you do not concur in them, at least I have never heard you say you did. In the first place, then, with regard to the fixture of the final of Kilk. Co., there is a rule which says that this match must be played in the City of Kilk. This is virtually a handing over of the county championship to the favoured clubs of Tullaroan and "Erin's Own". Kilkenny is "homegrounds" for either of these teams, just as Waterford would be "homegrounds" for Mooncoin. It is a recognised fact, proven time and time again, that when teams are about evenly matched, the team on the home-ground is sure to win. This is so true that in professional base-ball and lacrosse in Canada and the United States, the great teams calculate to win 9 out of 10 games on their homegrounds, and are satisfied if they only win one out of three games on the premises of their rivals. What is to be thought of a rule that, year after makes Moondharrig play for the Co. champ on the home-grounds of their rivals, where 19 out of every 20 of the spectators are actively in favour of their opponents and where even the county officials appointed to positions on the field of play cannot hide their partisanship and their hostility to the southern club? Why is not a neutral venue, agreeable to both teams, chosen for such an important match?

Wexford, Carrick or Dungarvan would be satisfactory to Mooncoin, and, of course, the Northern teams would never dream of coming to Moondharrig's home-grounds at Waterford! would scarcely be fair to ask them, and anyway they are too "cute" and have too much of a "pull" with the county officials to allow of a venue at Waterford. Until such a time as this silly rule is rescinded and abolished, I am now advising the Moondharrig, All-Ireland hurlers to withdraw from the county team. The Kilkenny County Board and the whole north and middle of the county, which has shown very little favour to these boys, may perhaps win All-Ireland Championships without their aid, but, at least, the Moondharrig men will have the satisfaction of knowing they are not being used as tools and catspaws! greater graver question arises with regard to the treatment accorded to all the players by the county and provincial boards of the G.A.A. There is deep dissatisfaction amongst the young men who don the suits and endure the dangers and fatigue of the game. Do they get all the honour and consideration to which they are entitled. I am speaking now of all the teams, Kilk. Cork, Tipp. Wexford etc. As far as I hear, few of these splendid young fellows are satisfied with how they are treated by the G.A.A. officials. I have heard them complain that they strive before thousands for the glory of the game; they make big "gates" which are taken charge of by the officials, but in return they are treated quite shabbily. matches which bring big gates, they do not even get their fares, and in the big inter provincial contest they get a miserable pittance, only enough to get a cheap meal, and for any further expenses they have to go down in their own pockets, and pay their own way? Most of these great athletes, the glory of Ireland, are poor fellows who only earn a shilling a day. How can they be encouraged to stay at home in Ireland, if they are thus treated? After the great game against Wexford I came back with the Moondharrig members of the county team to the place in Dublin where they were supposed to get their meal. They sat down for ten minutes at an empty table and found nobody to serve, or even look at them. They came home, after that terrible contest, where all Ireland looked with wonder on their great deeds - they came home without a bite or a sup, and had to search in Waterford at midnight, hungry and tired and sore, for something to allay their pangs of starvation! What good was it all for them, the shouting thousands, the over-flowing gate receipts? After

such a contest in America or Canada, national champions such as these Wexford, Tipp., Kilk. and Cork hurlers, would be taken charge of immediately and hurried to refreshing shower baths, and would find themselves seated before well-replenished tables and treated with all honour Doubtless it will be answered and distinction! that with the small entrance fee charged, luxuries like these are beyond the means of the G.A.A., but at least a vast improvement could be made upon the present method of doing things. time that captains of the great teams got together and demanded better treatment and consideration. Were an independent league formed, even for one year, with only gaelic players as officials, and nobody allowed to hold any office unless he could stand the brunt of the game upon the field, the G.A.A. would very soon come to time, and its officials be more mindful of the honour due the Players, considering the big gates playing gaels. that are taken in, should get extra-liberal travelling expenses, and have things everywhere better arranged for their conveniences and comfort. The spectacle of players walking six or seven miles into a town and then taking a train for a long journey of half a day or so is too much of a hardship to The discipline and regard with equanimity. restraint induced by the G.A.A. are beyond all praise, and it would be a great pity to see the organisation wrecked, but why do we hear these loud murmurs of dissatisfaction from the players, the men who are bearing the brunt of the fight, The awards to and the heat of the contest! injured players are also totally inadequate. now the supreme duty of the G.A.A. Council to show proof that these accusations which are being heard all round either are groundless or nonexistent, or, if existent are unavoidable. And if non unavoidable, they should at once get to work and remedy them. The glory of gaelic sport and the manhood of the hurling gaels demand it imperiously.

Tipp. drew first blood with a goal by Jack Gleeson answered by Kelly within a minute, the first of his two goals in the first half, the other one by Mike Doyle T. 4-1, K. 3-1. In the second half Mike Doyle who had received a head injury in the first was forced to retire after a brilliant display and was replaced by L. Dunphy. The quality of the hurling was superb and excitement intense as time ran out with Tipp. a point in front. Then on time, Power saving a blinder saw the ball strike a forward's chest and into the net. MOONCOIN VETERANS 1913 STEAL SHOW AND WIN!

Oct. 12th. At Waterford Gaelic Pk.

Co. S.H. Ch. Final. Mooncoin 5-7 (4-4), Tullaroan 3-4 (1-2).

South Kilkenny, particularly Mooncoin area. converged "en masse" on Waterford Gaelic Grounds in anticipation of another heroic struggle between these ancient stalwarts of the game. All modes of travel, ancient and modern, were summoned into use but, for most, it was "shanks mare". Much debate and speculation occupied the "experts" beforehand as to which team would benefit from the reduction to 15 aside (previously 17), as well, of course, as Tullaroan's reaction to playing in Mooncoin's backyard instead of their own. In the 1911 final played at Kilk, July 1912 Tullaroan had come from behind in the second half to account for Mooncoin by four points. They were now quite confident with a strong contingent of supporters down from the Marble City. Besides Mooncoin had had a comparatively easy run in the championship with a walk-over from Piltown in the first round, a tight game against Dicksboro with some players missing in the second and then a bye in the third which took them into the final.

Referee Ned Tarrant got the game underway and after some tussling at both ends, Kelly opened the scoring blasting an over-head crossball to the net. As the game wore on, inevitably some of the individual duels on the field became as "important almost as the game itself. The battle of the captains "Drug" at full back marking the brilliant Sim Walton with honours even, and so with other inter-county household names. Mooncoin's greater speed and first time striking gave them the edge in the first half and a lead at H.T. M. 4-4, T. 1-2. Tom Kennedy injured in the first half was replaced by McCormack after the interval. Play continued fast and crisp in the second mojety with neither side gaining a decisive advantage. Tullaroan added 2-2 to Mooncoin's 1-3 which left the full-time score Mooncoin 5-7, Tullaroan 3-4 a clear three goal win to M.

KILKENNY'S GOLDEN YEARS

It may be appropriate here to review Mooncoin's contribution to Kilkenny's golden age of Inter Co. Ch. Competition. In the early days the County Champions represented the County or "having the call" sometimes made a token gesture in calling a few of the beaten finalists. In the '97 Championship, Mooncoin had, John Quinn, Pat Fielding and MI. Merry on the Co. team, in '98 we again had three - John and Thos, Quinn and Dick Walsh (The Manager). This practice obtained to 1903 when, it seems with Threecastles the Co. Champions - enlightenment dawned, the old parochial mould was cast aside and abandoned with all its constraints - an attempt was made to select the best team from all players within the With Mick Dalton, Threecastles, the captain, Kilk. made it to the All-Ireland Final against Cork at Dungarvan where they were comprehensively beaten (8-9 to 0-8). However, they had got to the final and learned much. The Mooncoin representation - John and Pat Fielding, Jim Synnott, Neddy Doyle and Jack Quinn.

In 1904 with Tullaroan - Co. Champs (Sim Walton - Sec, and Ger. Doheny, Capt, the formula of '03 was retained and with what success?

Inter-County hurling proper had arrived and had begun to move on to a new plane in quality and in significance - on to the National Stage becoming thereby an expression of identity a movement and a goal. It had moved from the cross-road to the National Statium. Kilkenny had made their first step into becoming a team 'par excellence' without peer - a team of stars without a star they were to revolutionise the approach to the game and were, in those years, to be blessed with the greatest P.R.O. man the game has had the poet-priest, Fr. J.B. Dollard "Slievenamon" - whose contribution to the legitimate popularising of the game has never been equalled.







SOME PEN PICTURES

Dick 'Drug' Walsh (1878-1958) b. Rathkieran.

By the turn of the century 'Drug' Walsh had acquired the necessary skills on the land, the river and, the hurling field. He normally played full-back on the Mooncoin Team whereas his usual position on the County Team was centre-half

back. Wiry, medium-sized, sure and positive in his play, with exceptional speed of delivery, right or left on the ground or overhead. His extreme fitness, ever-present enabled him to out-pace, out-stay and out-play his opponent. An astute tactician he marshalled and directed his men to good purpose on the field of play. A legend while

yet playing, he won seven Leinster and All-Ireland H. medals, captained three All-Ire. winning Teams, captained Leinster to win the Railway Shield outright in 1908, won one Munster Feis and three Co. Sen. Ch. Medals, two of them as Captain.

Eddie Doyle (1887-1971) b. Dournane.

At Mooncoin National School coached by Pat O'Neill, P. 1869-1908 in the rudiments of the game. Played Senior Ch. for Mooncoin at fifteen and for Kilkenny against Cork a year later in the 1903 final. Thereafter in six winning finals 1904-1912 and on the bench in 1913 for which he received his seventh medal. He usually played left half back for the County. Was on the Leinster Railway Shield winning Team 1908. On the Kilk. winning Team against Cork in Munster Feis Final at Dungarvan which game - his favourite remembrance - 'Hurling of the highest order, brilliant exhibition of overhead hurling - a tough, hard but fair game! In those distant days fitness was a way of life and at a trim, hard, eleven and a half stone Neddy feared no forward. He won six All-Ire. Medals, Railway plus one (on bench). Shield 1907-08, Munster Feis and three Co. S.H. Ch. + one Triple S.H.Ch. 1916, 17, 18.

Dick Doyle (1888-1959) Dournane.

Pattern of hurling-life similar to Needy's. Played in 1903 Ch. and at 16 with Kilk. Co. Team in full forward line where he was to remain. Won seven All-Ire. Railway Shield, Munster Feix 1912, three Co. Ch. + one Triple 1916 - 18. Had an exceptional game in Munster Feis Medals final 1912 - great exponent of ground technique. fitness fanatic - when training had finished for the others Dick carried on with a few extra rounds of the field in hob nailers as a handicap. When he changed to normal playing boots, he claimed he telt no weight and ran like a hare. Decried wides as a free puck from hand to the opposition. A tactic he and Mick, while hugging the end line employed was to play the ball at speed across the goalmouth for Jimmy Kelly's lightening reaction to out-strike the opposition.

DICK DOHERTY (1886-1966) M.

Another member of the famous six - Drug, 3 Doyles, J. Kelly + Dick D. who won five All-Ireland from 1907 to 1913. Light in physique yet a magnificent hurler an outstanding class

player of immense artistry. His ability to kill a ball stone dead overhead and move with it there in any direction seems to have been uniquely his, coupled with his skills he was endowded with great speed. Won five All-Ire. 1907, '09, '11, '12, '13. Railway Shield 1908, Munster Feis Final 1912, Three Co. Ch. 1906, '08, '13 and Jun. H. Ch. 7 medal 1922.

Mick Doyle (1889-1970) (D)

Attended, like his brothers, M. Nat. Sch. with Pat O'Neill P. In 1904 at fifteen years he played for Mooncoin in Co. Ch. Played left full-forward on Co. Team in 1907, combining with his brother Dick on the other side with great accuracy and speed. He, likewise, had a great understanding with Dick Doherty outside him on the half line. A classy, stylish player with pinpoint accuracy. At Dungarvan in Croke Cup Final in which Cork 8-1 beat Kilk. 6-1, Mick Doyle scored 6-0 in the 2nd half. Won 5 All-Ire. 1907-'09,'11,'12,'13 Railway Shield 1908, Muns. Feis 1912, 3 Co. Ch + 1 Triple (1916-17-18).

Jimmy Kelly (1884-1966) Ballygorey.

Educated at Carrigeen N.S. and Mount Sion Christian Brothers. Played with Ballyduff S.H. Club (Co. Wat) across the river and in 1900 at 16 yrs played for Wat. v Limerick in Tipperary Town. He is credited with arousing new interest From his earliest in the game in Waterford Co. days he had a fetish for accuracy - practiced assiduously for hours. He used a 20 ft. ladder for shooting up and down between the rungs and narrowed the opening by angling the ladder. A natural left-hander he was equally deft either side - on the ground or overhead and a devastatingly brilliant exponent of the 'whip' - the dropping ball met on the rise - When he got one of these particularly on his favoured left - the ball pierced the light barrier. Played with Mooncoin 1901 and with the County - 1904 when he had an outstanding game in Leinster Final v Dublin at Enniscorthy in which he was injured - However, he received his first All-Ireland medal in 1904 though he did not actually play in the final and afterwards added 1905, '07, '09, '11, '12, '13. In the Railway Shield Final of 1905 he played with Munster v Leinster marking Matt Gargan. Played on victorious Leins. Teams of 1907 and 1908. Munster Feis Medals competition final of 1912 plus three Co. Ch. medals. He always played full forward and his understanding with the Doyles either side of him, Sim Walton outside and Dick Doherty was uncanny. He was dubbed "the scoring machine" by none other than Fr. J. B. Dollard.

Jimmy Kelly, of low stature but heavily built, he moved like greased lightening and struck the ball even quicker.

At Dungarvan — Easter Sunday, Apr. 12th 1914 Mooncoin 5 - 4 beat Blackrock 3 - 2 in "the Kelly Benefit". Shortly afterwards Jimmy K. emigrated to New York and much of his reputation inevitably went with him. He continued playing - took out U.S. citizenship - and joined the Forces.

Then sudden rang Tumultuous cheers, from all the Leinster host

BOB O'KEEFFE Glengrant PRESIDENT OF THE G.A.A. 1935 - 1938

Bob O'Keeffe was born in Glengrant, Mooncoin near the Banks of the River Suir in 1880. From an early age he was interested in sport, especially hurling. While doing his teacher training in the De La Salle Waterford, he won trophies of all sorts, some of them are still in good order in his old homestead. When he graduated, he got an appointment in Dunboyne, Co. Meath.

Bob had never played for his county, but in 1908, as Meath had not played in the Railway Shield Championship, Bob was included in the Leinster side as a member of the Mooncoin Club to play Tipperary and they won by 0-14 - 2-5.

Bob O'Keeffe never did play for Kilkenny. He subsequently took up a teaching post in Borrisin-Ossory, Co. Laois, and though then in the veteran stages, played a major part in helping win their only Senior All-Ireland Title in 1915. He played in that game.

He then became a prominent figure in the G.A.A. Councils and was President of the Association from 1935 - 38. He was Secretary of the Leinster Council up to time of his death. While he was in Dunboyne, Co. Meath, he twice won the Long Puck Championship of Ireland. He developed neuritis in his sixties and died in 1949. He is survived by four daughters and two sons.

After his death, the G.A.A. decided to donate a trophy in his memory - The Bob O'Keeffe Memorial Cup. It was to be given to the winners of the Leinster Final each year. The trophy is a massive affair, standing 3 feet 8 inches, weighing 564 ounces and has a capacity of 6 gallons. The Celtic chase work has been taken from The Book of Kells. The hurler depicted on the top of the Cup is barefooted, which is significant in view of the fact that the late Bob O'Keeffe originally played in that manner.

At Knocktopher. The long awaited final of the 1916 S.H.Ch. and which, later in the wisdom of the Co. Board, was classed as incorporating the years 1917 and 1918 when championships failed to be completed. Dick Holohan and his Football Club were, as usual, meticulous and fastidious with the arrangements. Crowds came from all parts of the County and from Counties about the County, from Tipp. to Carlow and Wexford to Waterford, to see true class exponents of the highest skills and disciplines of Gaeldom's Ancient

Mooncoin opened with a penalty goal, to which Tullaroan answered with a Builder centres beautifully and the M. forwards, rush through another goal. When at a meeting of the Leinster Council following the fixing of the replay at Callan, Mooncoin appealed from the Co. Committee, Mr J. Shouldice, Secretary of the Council said that while the Council could not accept the appeal as it did not concern any rule or breach of a rule in the official guide, he was instructed to state that the Committee should endeavour to facilitate the appealing club by fixing a more neutral venue than Callan. The Council did not wish to dictate to the Committee on what was purely a county matter, but they were disirous that the Committee should give satisfaction to all parties concerned by having venues as neutral as possible.

There was no delegate from Mooncoin or Tullaroan at the meeting and Mr H. Heffernan proposed and Mr John Ryan seconded that the 1919 Sen. Co. Final be dropped. The resolution was passed unanimously.




MOONCOIN LOSE THE WALSH BROTHERS OF CLOGGA

The above match - Mooncoin v Rest of Kilk. was the last occasion on which any of the Clogga Walsh brothers played for Mooncoin. They had already won the Triple Champ. Medals issued for Pat retired from active play 1916, '17, '18. while Jim and Jack moved to Dublin and played with Faughs Club and Dublin Co. thereafter. Jim 'Builder' had played for Kilk. in Leins S.H. Final v Wexford and then the All-Ire. Final lost to Tipp, in 1916. His last appearance for Kilk. was in the Leinster Final of 1919 when beaten by Dublin. He played in five All-Ireland Finals with Dublin winning three - 192-, 1924, 1927 and He played on three losing 1921 and 1930. winning Leinster Railway Cup Teams and was the only player to participate in three Tailteann He played fifteen years for Faughs. He won seven Leins. S.H. Medals and captained Dublin in 1930. He won five Dublin S.H. Ch and capt. Faughs 1925, 1926, 1928, 1932 and won six

Dublin S.Hs League Medals. Also played hand ball and shinty. Was Chairman of Dublin Co. Board in 1929 and 1930. As hurler, he was and remains one of the all-time greats of the game. Died 1949.

Jack played left half-forward in the Leins Jun. H. Final of 1915. Played Sen. Inter-Co. thereafter and won 1916 Co. S.H. Ch Medals with Mooncoin. As stated, played for Mooncoin v Rest in 1920. Then moved to Dublin and Faughs with whom he won three Co. S.H. Ch. and three S.H. Leagues. Played in goal for Leins H. in 1924 Tailteann games. Played in 1937 for his Club in Jun. grade. Died unexpectedly July 1958.

Pat played Sen. hurling with Mooncoin 1915-20 winning the triple medal 1916-17-18. Played in 1919 and with Mooncoin v Rest in 1920, brilliant back - not far behind his illustrious brother Jim 'Builder'.

THE DOYLES OF DOURNANE

The Parish of Mooncoin in S. Kilkenny and particularly one of it's villages, Dournane, in the latter half of the 19th century was a very densely populated village. In the parish of Mooncoin and in this village, hurling flourished - a more polished and skilful brand, not as rugged as in other pockets throughout the country where the old game still lingered on.

Dournane could boast of putting onto the field a village team of 21 that could match the best within the parish or surrounding countryside. This would be 20/30 years prior to the advent of the G.A.A. It could even be said that Mooncoin participated in the 1st unofficial All Ireland when a team from Mooncoin that included names like Fogarty, Deady, Ryan and Quinn travelled from Grange station to play a Thurles selection.

Around the 1890's there was a teacher in Mooncoin by the name of O'Neill who was dedicated to hurling and he inspired his pupils and promoted and organised games within the parish. This man may be said to be the principal one behind the scenes in the great Mooncoin team of the early 20th century.

It was into an atmosphere of this kind that the Doyle family - 6 boys and 3 girls were born. Two of these boys were priests and 4 worked on the family farm for the early years of their lives and later one, Mick, sent to Waterford city to serve his time as a draper.

O'Neill was a great inspiration and influence, he was also a great monitor of the game and players, so much so that he predicted Dick Doyle even at this early age as a future Kilkenny great. All the encouragement he could he gave to his boys and coached them as more or less our modern coaches do.

In this atmosphere it is little wonder that the Doyle family took to hurling and to support it from their maternal side they had an uncle, Jonhhy Dunphy, who prior to his departure to the U.S.A.

was an accomplished hurler. Their grand-uncles, Henebrys of Dournane, were champions Oars Men and monarchs of all at the old Waterford Regatta,

On their paternal side a grand-uncle, Mick Doyle, was a prominent athlete and brought off several prizes in hop-step-leap from places as far away as Clonmel, and in doing so incurred the wrath of the Military. Another brother of his, John was a skilful hurler and played for the Barony of Iverk.

At this time intense rivalry existed between the Barony of Iverk and Knocktopher. This was the time when fences at both ends were the goals. Now this John Doyle was married into the Barony of Knocktopher (Castlebanny). There was custom at this time to "sod the wheat" with the plough (a timber one). During the 1st year in his new abode the coulter of his plough was stolen and he returned home on a particular Sunday to borrow a replacement. On this particular Sunday, whether by accident or design, the inter-barony game between Iverk and Knocktopher was in progress at a place called Miltown, Templeorum. Some of the Iverk contestants were injured and as he was known to be a former prominent Iverk player he was prevailed upon to play, much to his dislike, against his adopted Barony of Knocktopher. He came as a spectator and had no hurley with him but he went into the fray with the timber coulter of the plough! (The coulter would have been much heavier than a hurley even of that time).

Living on an average farm even in Mooncoin in the early days of the 20th century was by no means easy and any side-lines which would supplement the family budget would be a great boost to the income. It was a custom at that time to put up for tender the maintenance of certain sections of the local public road and so the Doyle family where there were four young boys undertook the job of maintaining the road that leads from the village of Mooncoin to Dournane. This entailed hard work for the provision of road material had to be quarried locally. To quarry this stone was really the

acid test of stamina and muscle. This work was what the Doyle brothers maintained developed their muscles and hurleys were like feathers compared with swinging a 28lb sledge hammer to strike the quarry drill.

O'Neill as has been said was the driving force. He was joined later by John Fielding - who had been a clerical student in St. Kierans. These two along with Dick "na Dhoire" Walsh (who was later Manager of Kilmacow Creamery) and Dickey Dunphy, were the chief organisers of the great Mooncoin team of the first decade of this century.

Strange to say that Dick Doyle's 1st game outside of Mooncoin was interprovincial and not He was a spectator at the Railway inter-county. shed game at Carrick-on-Suir and some of the Leinster team had failed to turn up and he was called in at the instigation of O'Neill and Fielding to fill the gap at the age od 17½ years and so began a hurling career which he courageously upheld for He was considered a fearless the next decade. attacker and great hurler who rarely did go for his own score but placed his comrades with the ball. The late Tom Mullins of Thomastown in assessing players of that era said "It is difficult to single out any players from such a galaxy but what I always remember about Dick Doyle is when he moved to the ball that the roar come from the crowd for very rarely when he moved was he beaten".

He was rarely too taken off his feet and hurled hip to hip. The late John T. Power (known as "the Bull Power") admitted in public in later years that he himself was only once taken off his feet and the man to do it was Dick Doyle.

His combination with his brother Mick, Doherty and Jimmy Kelly, as well as his outgoing passes to flying incoming Walton paved the foundation for many Kilkenny great victories of this era. His brother Mick on the left and opposite wing was a wonderful overhead hurler and could double on a ball with deadly accuracy, he was slighter than Dick and was tricky and could flick the ball to a team mate when his way to the goal was blocked. Being of lighter physique than Dick he was often the target for a strong back but he seemed to revel in it and his foot balance never left him down. It was little wonder that these two brothers often swapped places for intervals. Dick would move over to 'soften' up Mick's man.

Eddie who played as wing back may not be quite as skilful as his brothers, nevertheless he was a great sideline taker or "touches" as he called them and also a striker of the "70". Very few forwards succeeded in getting inside him. He to use his own expression again, to "clinch" with the forward under the dropping ball. He was also very daring in 'snapping' a ball out of the air.

A complete revolution in the style or art of hurling took place with the advent of this Kilkenny Team. Hitherto the game had been more over robust than skillful but these Mooncoin forwards and Walton brought a new dimension into game combination, skill and science or art. The longer the team remained together the more the game was perfected. It was said up to the 70's that it was the best combination ever to leave Kilkenny. Dick Doyle was probably the centre-piece of this passing movement in the forward. In the Croke Cup Final in which Tipp. beat Kilkenny early in 1913 by double score 8 - 8 to 4 - 4, both himself and Jim Kelly were absent. It was at this time that it was said "you need Mooncoin for Munster".

Kilkenny as is well known, won during this era 7 All-Irelands within the space of 10 years, 1904, 1905, 1907, 1909, 1911, 1912, 1913. This period too was a difficult time for it was beset with troubles. As you know it was the beginning of the national revival - the Gaelic spirit of the Nation was beginning to reawake. At this time too many of the Kilkenny championship games were played Waterford field also catered for in Waterford. other codes and British soldiers and was not a This was resented by many Gaelic sportsfield. and particularly by Mooncoin. In an effort to make it a Gaelic sportsfield Mooncoin refused to participate in any fixtures made for the venue. A crisis was reached in approx 1910 when Kilkenny Co. Board fixed a game for Waterford. forfeiture of the match was the only alternative for Mooncoin if they failed to play there. Mooncoin fielded a team - minus the Doyles and Jim Kelly and were beaten. This dispute had a profound effect on the 1910 County team, despite the fact that all turned out.

Wexford won Leinster and All-Ireland and had Kilkenny won this 1910 championship they would have set an all time record of 5 in a row. (Waterford eventually became a Gaelic sportsfield and Mooncoin selection played Laois - capt. by Bob O'Keeffe - at Waterford 6 weeks prior to

Laois winning their first All-Ireland in 1915 and played a draw with them).

Around 1912 Kilkenny reached their peak and had developed hurling into a fine art. At the same time a great team was building up in Tipperary powered by a club known as Toomevara greyhounds because of their speed. Toomevara were unbeaten in any challenge, tournament or C'Ship game from 1912 - 1913. Tipperary beat Kilkenny in the Croke Cup by double score in Dungarvan. In the Munster C'Ship of 1913 Tipperary beat all before them and Kilkenny did likewise in Leinster. Both teams reached the All-Ireland with big reputations behind them and interest in the All Ireland was nationwide. (15,000 assembled at Jones Road to witness the battle between the hurling giants). The real merit of Kilkenny victories of the previous years was now on trial. They were considered old campaigners by some but never the less Dick Doyle who was to win his 7th, medal on this day was 27 years and younger brother Mick who was to win his 5th, was just 25 years. The eldest brother Eddie was a sub. and this was the first 15 a side All-Ireland

20,000 spectators (with the gates closed long before the game) would at this time really show the nationwide interest as all those fans travelled by train.

In this game Kilkenny made the ball travel and brought the 'Greyhounds' to their own speed.

"With Tipp, bombarding and Power still guarding, the leather travelled at lightening speed".

"Their combination is a revelation, in every station and our boys succeed".

"Ah what could equal the Doyles and Doherty and Jim Kelly, Moondharrigs Gael,

"Their splendid passing was Tipp's outclassing theres none could beat them in Inisfail".

This certainly was the day that Mooncoin forward combination played a vital role. This victory was also considered one of the sweetest of all Kilkenny's wins around this era. My mother who with her sister Mrs. Hogan were both at the game and stayed in Kilkenny on Sunday night. The excitement in Kilkenny this night reached

fever pitch, bands playing, tar barrels burning etc., and later on the Corporation honoured the champions with a banquet and were presented with a schroll of honour and made freement of the city. They were also presented with a cheque for £18.00 per man.

This latter gesture proved in hindsight to be improvident as far as the Doyles were concerned as it created a lot of jealousy. £18.00 at that time was a lot of money. Whisperings were abroad that the Doyles had made £54.00 out of the hurling. These whisperings soon reached their ears and this had a big effect on the Doyles, especially Dick who became less enthusiastic from now on.

Cleavages in the Kilkenny side caused a lot of disunity in 1914 and Kilkenny only half-heartedly faced Laois in the Leinster final. They were beaten by a Laoise team captained by a Mooncoin man, Bob O'Keeffe. Mick Doyle continued on until 1916 V. Tipperary All-Ireland. He did his utmost to induce his brother Dick to play on that day and he always maintained that had he played, Kilkenny might have taken the title on that day. With his absence and the departure of Kelly to U.S.A. the former great forward combination was completely disorganised.

Mick Doyle, strange to say, played his 1st. intercounty game with Waterford in the Munster C'Ship V. Limerick. In that game he played on Tyler Mackey (Mick's father). Tyler had slowed up very much at this stage and this lad from Mooncoin was too fast for him but he threatened him on one occasion after he had slipped past him with the ball. "If you come near me again, I'll flatten you". Tyler played with a big heavy hurley which as Mick Doyle said "would be more suitable for a Pick axe handle".

How did they train in those days?

In those days hurling practice was in progress every suitable evening outside of the busy season (Harvest, Hay etc.) A field in Rathkieran was the venue opposite Fieldings house and the field was placed at their disposal by the Irish family of Aglish. This was the recognised training ground and Sundays and on evenings several followers flocked to see them in action. Mick Doyle did much of his training in Waterford on a level spot of ground where the Ardree Hotel is now. It was

the only level spot on a large slope. Trespassers were strictly forbidden by the Fleming family who owned it as it was so close to the town. But Mick Doyle and friends Harry Matthews and Sean Kiely were welcome to use it.

Then on Thursdays he would walk home to Dournane and if no urgent work was in progress on the farm he would along with local curate retire to a private field in the farm which was near the village of Mooncoin. The local curate Dr. Doyle of Cuffsgrange, or any other priest could not be seen togged out hurling. This field was not too far from Drugs house and in a short while Dick Doherty and Drug would hop over the fence and join them.

As far as Dick and Eddie were concerned, their training in later years consisted in runs for cows in the morning to the banks of the river. They trained hard in their early days and as they said they built muscles swinging the sledge in the quarry. Their father too was interested in hurling and attended all the games in which they played as long as he was able. He died prior to the 1913 final. My mother told me she followed a crowd to Grange station in 1906 for the 1st. All-Ireland won by Kilkenny. Her father on seeing her at the station ordered her home, but a relative, Patsy Dunphy, intervened and suggested that he would take care of her and so she saw Kilkenny win their first All-Ireland, a fact of which she was later very proud.

In later years their father was not able to go to the matches but eagerly awaited the arrival of the train to Grange Station and if the wind was favourable the cheers at the station signified victory. But not always did the train come to Grange station. Often the team disembarked in Kilmacow or Waterford. "Big Ned" O'Keeffe was always the first with the good or bad news. On passing the Doyle homestead on his way from one of the village pubs he knocked at the window of the back of the house shouting "are you there Doyle, your men won again" and if they lost "they fell on their" On the evening of 1907 final played in Dungarvan, he had an addition to telling him "your men won". "Do you know who started the match, Andy, he came straight from Cobh to Dungarvan'', (he was referring to Rev. Andy Doyle in U.S.A. and surprised all by an unexpected arrival at the grounds and was given the honour of throwing in the ball).

Their mother always insisted on whatever members remained at home to milk the cows and this would be some of the sisters, they had to kneel down in the kitchen at the time of the match and say the Rosary, "the lads are now giving their red sweat in Dublin".

The night of a match, or the night after it if the game was far away, was the night of a big gathering in the Doyle homestead. All the Mooncoin contingent as well as the neighbours gathered there to hear the game hurled all over again, where it was won or lost, as the case may be. The occasions on which Kilkenny lost during this era were very few. Their last game with Mooncoin was in 1918 Championship in the replay at Knocktopher with Tullaroan which they won. Their last appearance in Black and Amber was in James park in 1923 when the "old" team played the "new" Kilkenny team in an exhibition match.

The three brothers, Neddie, Dick and Mick, have won 18 All-Ireland medals on the field and a total of 19 as Neddy was a sub. on 1913 side. This is a record not liekly to be beaten for some time, if ever. The Graces of Tullaroan have 14 medals (3 of which were football) and they were not all won with Kilkenny (Jack won 5 with Dublin.)

1924 ECHOES OF YESTERYEAR

Record attendance witnessed a splendid game (with the winners to meet Dicksboro in the final). Weather a little inclement - concluding stages saw ball and pitch get greasy. Both teams had their All-Ireland heroes Tullaroan - Dick Grace, Holohan and Maher while Mooncoin included W. & E. Dunphy, M. Mc Donald, T. & J. Carroll, R. & E. Doyle. Grace - sole Tullaroan survivor of the 1904-'13 team put in a tremendous hour's work and gave a wonderful display as did Holden and Maher. Of that great era Mooncoin had Dick Doyle (7 All-Ire. Medals) whose display proved that he had not yet quite lost the art which once rendered him one of the most consistently brilliant marksmen of a gifted forward line before which even the most doughty backs quavered. Ed Doyle improving gave a polished display; his clean accurate striking and his long precise deliveries were a feature of the game. Many shrewd judges mark him one of the most finished players at present in the country. Mark McDonald in goal, the Dunphy brothers and the Carroll brothers all gave a fine display. Joe Fewer in the backs gave his finest display so far for Mooncoin; his long and accurate clearances were a feature. Mooncoin alone scored in the first half. H.T. Mooncoin 0-3, Tullaroan 0-0. After the interval Mooncoin continued the pressure and added a point followed by a goal. Tullaoran rallied and rushed through a goal immediately followed by another but there their effort lapsed. Mooncoin finished the stronger and added two more goals before the final whistle. Mooncoin 3-4, Tullaroan 2-0. 1 / 1 Referee, Peter Walsh.

On resuming Mooncoin put in a great effort to regain the initiative and it was touch and go for the third quarter but again Dicksboro gained control and scored freely in the last quarter. F.T. Tullaroan were stylish and pleasant hurlers, their forwards, however, failed to finish and their goalie, who had been ordered not to play, was weak on the day.

Some 5,000 people packed the banks all round the arena and a specially created double row of touchline seats was filled. Special train from Kilk, brought large contingent of Jas. Stephen supporters. The team from Mooncoin confirmed their right to figure as holders in the championship final this year and their victory was received with delirious joy. Their greater power and weight were the chief factors enabling them to oust a set of fifteen little hurlers who must be the smartest in Kilkenny. They held the advantage in speed which helped them to make a fine struggle but when the finesse was rudely cut out by Mooncoin and Stephens endeavoured to have an eye for an eye, the Southerners slowly but surely overpowered the city lads. Double scores, however,

flattered the measure of Mooncoins superiority. At the interval there was but a point in the difference and at one point in the 2nd half, when Stephens grasped a two point lead, it seemed as if they would prevail. Mooncoin, however, lasted the better and because of this, more than anything else, secured big lead at the finish. A very fast pace was maintained and at times the hurling was thrilling and stirring struggles were witnessed throughout the field. Immediately after the throw-in the Southerners broke away and attacked hotly, securing a '70' right away which T. Carroll landed in the square and Allen unceremoniously smashed into the net. 3 Play swung from end to end with astonishing rapidity before E. Dunphy scored a point from midfield. He shortly afterwards added another minor in similar fashion, and after fifteen minutes play Mooncoin held a clear lead of five points. Then Walsh, the Mooncoin goalkeeper saved his goal at the expense of a point but Stephens maintained the pressure and added a goal and a point before H.T. Mooncoin 1-3, Jas Stephens 1-2. At start of second half when Stephens forwards moved in Walsh ran out of his goal in the excitement and Gleeson (Stephs) banged the ball into the untenanted net. 

LETTER FROM FR. DOLLARD TO THE GREAT G.A.A. WRITER "CARBERY"

Dear Carbery,

Mooncoin 8th July 1929.

It did my heart good to meet you in the bosom of your happy family in Dublin during the great Emancipation week and many of the things we talked about, —I have since retailed to the hurlers. Our friend "Builder Walsh" is still firm as the Rock of Cashel in his allegiance to Dublin, the City of his adoption and of his love; but after Dublin, his heart's best wishes are for the success of Moondharrig and Kilkenny. As you know I never tried to influence him in that determination. I prefer him as he is, and he is doing great work for the G.A.A. in Dublin.

Yesterday, for old time sake, I went with some of the famous old hurlers to Rathkieran, the old rallying ground of the Moondharrig men. They were "peeled off" and had a "few strokes on the ball".

It was grand to see "Drug" Walsh in action again. He was in great form, and the things he did to the ball were worth seeing. 'If I could play in one more game - just one "said Drug" I think I could die happy". Afterwards we sat at Pat Fieldings fireside, where, of old - the Moondharrig heroes - "Drug" Walsh, the three Doyles, Dick Doherty, John Fielding and Jim Kelly the scoring machine had many a night sat in conference on knotty hurling problems and we talked of many things. "Drug" Walsh praised the Waterford hurlers "The Waterford hurlers" said he "are the nicest lot of fellows you'd meet in a weeks walk. They are grand boys and they deserve great credit for establishing the Gaelic game so strongly in a city devoted to Soccer, Rugby and Cricket. like to see them win the Munster continued "Drug" and even the All-Ireland. would be good for the spread of the Gaelic spirit and they deserve to have good fortune. And, the Waterford boys are real finished hurlers, too, let me tell you".

Then the great game in Dungarvan in 1908 came up. "Do you remember Jim Kelleher coming out like a steam-engine in front of the Cork goal? - coming out twenty times, and driving the ball through the whole crowd of you" I asked, "can I ever forget it" said Drug, "Ah! Jim Kelleher was the great man of them all, and they say he is as good a man today. You know we weren't any better that day than that Cork team. It was point for point and our turn was just over when the whistle blew. Another minute and Cork would have evened up and it would be the same old story." "Yes," I said, "I don't think there were Kelleher wouldn't let any goals scored at all. But what could he do when Jack them out. Anthony sent those long high balls sailing from the Moondharrig half-line - sailing high over the crossbar? Kelleher was a wonder, but alas! he wasn't Cuchulain to jump a hundred feet in the air!"

Then the discussion turned to hurling balls, Cantwell, the Mooncoin goalman condemned the practice of putting a new hard ball into play at every match. "A ball that has been played with for a week or more would be better. It would be bound to hop better and truer and would not be so uncertain or erratic in its movements. It would in fine, give the players a chance to show fine hurling to the spectators. "We all agreed with this contention."

Drug Walsh commented on the difficulty the spectators have in seeing the ball nowadays, and said that the ball should be whitened in some way, "well I said, I think you're right. The American baseball is as white as snow and everyone of the 50,000 spectators see it plainly for it shows white against the green of the grass or the brown of the houses, or the blue of the sky. It is covered with white kid, or calf-skin and there is no projecting I wonder why a hurling ball cannot be seam. made perfectly round like a baseball! What is the good of the heavy projecting seam? It only makes the ball awkward in its movements and hard to control. The ball, too, seems to be getting smaller and smaller. If this tendency keeps up there will be no ball at all - but all seam! The ball has become so small and hard now that it has become a danger to the players. Some day men will be killed by it, as certain as if it was a bullet. They'll be using a golf ball instead of a hurling ball the next thing you know".

And so, in pleasant converse, the time was " I asked John Dollard" (A returned passed. American) "a hard question the other day - I shouldn't have put it to him so blunt, but he got out of it very nicely, "said Drug", "we were after seeing Mooncoin win from the Eire Og, and I said to John straight "do you think the Mooncoin Team now is as good as the Mooncoin Team I had John Dollard hesitated a moment, long ago?'' then he replied bravely, "Well, Drug", said he, "I wouldn't say they're just as good - not quite but they're a wonderful team all the same''. "Begor, John answered me well, but I had no right to ask him that question", concluded Drug.

As we walked homeward along the broad road

to Moondharrig village it was a most beautiful evening. Slievenamon and the Comeraghs showed blue and clear as amethysts, and the sun shone brightly over the newly cut hayfields and the woodbine - scented hedgerows. We all agreed that Ireland was the loveliest country in the world and that a day of Irish hurling was the happiest day of all.



Fielding said "I had the honour to be selected to present the petition of Ireland's claim to recognition to President Wilson at the dead of night in the train at Washington, on his way to the Peace Conference to adjust International matters which I say he unadjusted together with Mr Lloyd George.

In conclusion - Always remember you are lrish ... live in Ireland, die in Ireland and go to Heaven from Ireland - the distance is shorter.

Sir,

Permit me through the columns of your popular paper to draw attention to the fact that nothing has been done by way of compensation by the G.A.A. Authorities to one of the Kilkenny Hurlers, Dick Morrissey, who was injured against Cork in the first match in the All-Ireland Final as far back as the 6th September last.

He has since been confined to hospital in Dublin, and up to the present neither himself nor his family have received one penny compensation. I appeal to the G.A.A. authorities, and I am sure every genuine Gael will agree with me, to take up the matter and see that some practical move is made to alleviate the great hardship imposed.

To the players are due, primarily, the success and upholding of the grand old traditions of the Gaelic Athletic Association which in the current year has reached its highest zenith, and they should be fairly treated when incapacitated by reasonable compensation to alleviate the loss and hardship imposed on both themselves and their dependents.



RETIREMENTS WATTIE DUNPHY AND LARRY CANTWELL

Both Wattie Dunphy and Larry Cantwell decided to call it a day after Carrickshock had beaten Mooncoin in the S.H. Ch. semi-final 1931. Both had blazed the trail and given great services to the club particularly during the '20s.

Wattie Dunphy came into prominence in the replay of the S.H. C. F. 1916 (played in 1919) and for which each member of the team received the unique triple-medal covering the years 1916-'17, '18. In the absence of Sen. Championships in 1920, '21, '22 he with brothers E. and R. helped Mooncoin to a Jun. H. Championship win v Tullow in 1920 and again the three of them helped Clonmore win the 1922 Jun. Ch. Fin. Wattie captained and Eddie played in what proved to be Kilkenny's only All-Ireland victory of the '20s over Tipperary in 1922. Played in the epic Leinster finals of '26 and '29 against Dublin and captained

the Leinster Team which lost to Munster in the Interprovincial Championship of 1930. He led Kilkenny, representing Leinster against Cork in the annual Whitsuntide Tournament in Liverpool and London in 1929. He captained Mooncoin Sen. from 1923, when beaten by Dicksboro in final, to 1931 which included the three in a row 1927, '28, '29 and the Nowlan Memorial Cup and Norris Cup in 1929.

He later moved to Narrabane where he died in 1973.

Eddie won medals in 1916 drawn game, 1920 and 1922 Jun. finals 1927, '28, '29. '32 + All-Ire. '22, and played '26.

Rd. won 1920 and '22 Jun. Finals and Sen. 1927, '28, '29 and '32.

Wm. won S. H. Ch. medals 1929, '32, '36. Joe won a Leinster medal v Dublin 1929. Tom, who played mostly Junior, was principally a backroom stalworth who gave years of service to the running of the M. Club.

Larry Cantwell first played for Mooncoin when beaten by Dicksboro in Jun. Ch. Final of 1914 and was on the Co. panel beaten by Tipp. in the All-Ire. final at Waterford. In 1917 played with brother Dick for Young Irelands, Waterford, winners of Championship v Ferrybank. Both returned to Mooncoin in mid - 20s and played with them into the 30s. Dick who played in goal, always carried a second weighted hurley for puckouts and frees about the back-line. When he played well, he could be brilliant. Larry when working in Arklow, cycled down to play and returned afterwards for work on Monday morning.



However James Stephens claimed they had scored an extra goal 5-2 so a special meeting held at the City Hall

to consider the referee's Report which stated Mooncoin 3-5, Jas. Stephens 4-2. Jas. Stephens insisted their score was 5-2 - Referee said he had blown the whistle for stoppage owing to encroachment of pitch by spectators. T. Dunphy (M) maintained the whistle had sounded before the score was made. The referee's (Mr Jas. Walsh, Carrickshock) report was adopted. Jas. Stephens representative gave notice of appeal.

The Replay took place at Nowlan Pk. on Oct. 18th, and extra-time to be played if match drawn at full time. T. Dunphy proposed Waterford as the venue without success. Furthermore, sidelines closed to spectators.

THRILLING FINAL

Nov. 22nd At N.Pk. Co. S.H.Ch. Final Mooncoin 4-2 (2-1), Tullaroan 4-1 (3-1).

Despite the lateness of the year a good crowd of some 4,500 gathered in expectation, if not of a classic certainly of an epic encounter - these teams from way-back seemed to speak no other language and so it turned out to be. The weeks of excitement and anticipation were realised to the full in this memorable and titanic struggle to the very last ball struck. Mr M.S. Flaherty of Tullamore had charge of the whistle and immediately he got the game started Tullaroan were away to a flying start and dominated the first quarter with White, Walsh and Murphy each scoring a goal to put them 3-0 to nil ahead. At this point Bergin (T) got injured and retired. Mooncoin tightened their defence with E. Doyle, Gorey, B. Dunphy and Kenny playing their hearts out while T. Carroll, half-back line, lent what support he could to centre-field in an effort to reduce the ball supply to the Tullaroan forwards. This stratagem proved effective, in large measure, in curtailing Tullaroan to just two scores for the remainder of the game. Mooncoin, on their part, began to attack - Locky Byrne sent a neat pass to A. Brennan who raised the green flag. Jimmy Brophy injured but resumed. Locky Byrne exchanged positions with Andy Brennan moving in

full forward from top of the right, and almost immediately combined well with Jimmy Brophy who slipped right through for a good goal..]. Hennebry added a further point before H.T. Tullaroan 3-1, Mooncoin 2-1. After the interval the same frantic pace continued. Locky Byrne pointed a free to close the gap to two points. The Mooncoin forwards contested fiercely, bustled and hustled the Tullaroan backs, while at the other end whenever the ball came near - White and Gorey were on a right shoot-out. Frees were missed on both sides as tension mounted. Paddy Phelan eluding close-marking Jack Duggan, sent a fifty yard shot to the net putting Tullaroan five points clear. But no! from the puck out Micky Keane doubled forty yds out and the difference In a concerted forward was two points again. rush, Keane, Byrne and Brophy with Brennan lending a hand, Brophy struck true and netted to give Mooncoin the lead for the first time in the match. In the dying minutes Lowry had two '70's' and going for the win landed both, with his customary precision, in the square but Mooncoin were not to be denied, nor was anybody or anything getting through in the last moments. F.T. Mooncoin 4-2, Tullaroan 4-1.

The final whistle found players and spectators alike drained if not satiated from a game which had


had so much - the flying start, the methodical recovery, the commitment everywhere. Doyle and Tommy Carroll who had both come back out of retirement, excelled themselves. Lowry and Paddy Phelan - what can one say? Always a credit to the game. Scintillating hurling. superb stickwork, craft and guile were all there. Tullaroan had played with great consistency throughout, but perhaps the occasional bustling tactics of Mooncoin had made the difference. As the spectators left the field that evening - no one could possible have foreseen, much less appreciated they had just witnessed the close of an era in Kilkenny hurling. The great confrontations, stretching back over half a century, between Tullaroan and Mooncoin had ended.

Note:

Eddie Doyle had played right full back and not his usual left full. Locky, as stated, started at right full switching to full exchanging with Andy Brennan / Bergin (T) centre-forward twisted knee and retired Tommy Carroll, captain, played his usual right half back position and inspired - with the three 'S's' so necessary for success - skill, speed and stamina.

Mooncoin and Tullaroan have now met in nine finals with the honours so far going to Tullaroan. They have won five as against four for Mooncoin. The winners were -

As can be readily seen it is now twenty five years since Tullaroan overcame Mooncoin in a final.

ONE OF THE GREATS RETIRES



Eddie Doyle (1897 - 1948) Luffany had an unsurpassed run at the top in Club and Inter-Co. Hurling for over twenty years. He opened there in 1919 - helping Mooncoin win a S.H.C. Triple medal for 1916, '17, '18. This was followed in the: absence of Sen. Championships with two Jun. H. Titles, 1920 and 1922 (none played in 1921) and then S.H.C. title wins '27, '28, '29, '32 (capt), and '36. Although he had retired in 1935, he returned to play a significant role in the 1936 final win. On the Inter-Co. scene he had a brilliant game against Cork in the '26 All-Ireland and again against the same opposition in the '31 All-Ire The following year '32 he won his first All-Ire, medal against Clare and then captained a successful Kilkenny defence against Limerick in In '34 he as well as the Nat. League. captained a successful Kilk. Tour of the U.S.A. Inter-Provincial - he played four times for Leinster v Munster. Sliabh Ruadh wrote of Eddie's game -"He was never a picker". He rarely raised or He believed in "the direct stopped a ball. method' and struck true and straight at the oncoming leather. For this very trait alone he was the idol of all old followers of the game. Although small in stature, E. Doyle had a wonderful reserve of energy, resilience and stamina. He never flinched from a forward, no matter his size or weight and almost invariably His powerful drives and delivered the goods.

deliveries were a treat to witness, and all spectators wondered how "one small man could hurl such as he". His reaction and timing were impeccable. In all he won twenty-nine medals for hurling. Passed to his rest in 1948.

1943 GRIM TRAGEDY ON RIVER

Jan. 10th Four Drown in Grim Tragedy.

When fishing cot capsized. News of the appalling disaster stunned South Kilkenny and beyond as word spread. Sen. H. Challenge Mooncoin v Mount Sion abandoned when news reached the pitch. The circumstances of the fatal occurrence - About 2.00 p.m. on Sunday a shooting party of seven men, two in one cot and five in another left Dournane for Darrigle on the other side of the river. The cot in which were MI. Hanlon and

Tom Henneberry was quickly away and reaching the other side.

Henneberry walked up the bank Tom while Ml. O'Hanlon secured the cot. Michael then noticed that his companions, still on the Kilkenny side of the river, were in difficulties. Suddenly - their cot capsized. Michael immediately jumped into his own, untied and paddled to the upturned boat where, one of the occupants, Mr Nicholas McSweeney exhausted, was still grimly clinging to the boat. With some difficulty MI. O'Hanlon got Mr McSweeney into his boat and headed straight for the Waterford On arriving there MI. Hanlon and T. bank. Henneberry together with Sergt. Whelan, who happened to be on duty locally, got Mr Mc Sweeney to the nearby farmhouse of Mr Ed. There, after being attended Cheasty, Darrigle. by Dr. Prenderville (Portlaw) Mr McSweeney sufficiently, went home. later, recovered Meanwhile, on Dournane side search parties were organised - L.D.F. under Group Leader Thomas Halpin, the L.S.F., local fishermen and others patrolled the river banks for any sign of the missing victims. The victims were -

Michael Murray (38), Ballykeoghan, married lorryowner.

Edward Quinlan (22), Ecclesiastical student within 6 months of Ordination, Kilcronagh, Kcow.

Ml. Moran (32) unmarried, Ballybrazil, first

cousin of above Edw. Quinlan.

Richard McSweeney (13) son of Mr. Nicholas McSweeney (rescued), Manager of Mvat. Co-Operative Creamery.

On Monday — only result of search was finding upturned cot and an oar at Mr. Congreve.

On Tues, members of the search party - Messrs R. Henneberry, John Henneberry Bbz, John Walsh (Phully) and Jas. Sinnott (M) brought to the surface the body of Edw. Quinlan at 6.30 p.m., within 300 yds of the spot where boat capsized.


On Wed. Body of MI. Murray recovered.

On Mon. evening, 1st Feb., body of MI. Moran (Bbz) recovered.

Body of Rd. Sweeney (13) was not recovered.

Mr N. McSweeney, the sole survivor, giving evidence at the inquest -

"When" he said "the cot was about 50 yds from the bank (Dour.) a huge wave came and partly filled it. The second wave came almost immediately afterwards. I stood up then, and the next thing I knew I was in the water --- lost sight of the others and went under the water". When he reached the surface again he saw his son, Richard McSweeney (13) some yards away from him. He did not see any of the others. He then saw another wave approaching and managed to grasp hold of the upturned cot by putting his arms around it and on this he maintained his grip until Michael O'Hanlon who, with T. Henneberry had been in the second boat, came to his rescue. Before concluding - he paid high tribute to the bravery of his rescuer, Michael O'Hanlon who, he said, had undoubtedly saved his life. He expressed thanks to the people of Mooncoin and the many who had taken part or assisted in the search for the bodies of victims.

'DRUG' PASSES ON

July. The legendary Dick Walsh passed on to his eternal reward - of whom Ned O'Keeffe wrote -Dick "Droog" Walsh was born in 1878 in the quiet Townland of Rathkieran, and went on to take his place among the immortals of hurling. His name has entered the folklore of the game. When he began his playing career he hurled side by side with men like Pat Fielding and big Jack Quinn -Mooncoin men who had been on Kilkenny All-Ireland teams through those early, soul-searing years of defeat and who had in turn hurled with those who'd been on "Foxy Billy" Walsh's team of twenty-one 'iron men' from The Glens. "Foxy Billy's" heroes brought its very first Leinster title to Kilkenny and Mooncoin away back in 1888.

That 'Droog' was a great hurler and lived for the game is beyond question - he had to be to hold his place on the team at a time when Kilkenny had so many great players. He won his first medal in 1904 and went on to add six more in the years 1905, '07, '09, '11, '12, '13. Kilkenny were a formidable force in that golden era and why they suffered defeat in '06, '08 and '10 is rather a Added to his seven Leinster Championships he won county senior medals with Mooncoin 1906, '08, and '13. "Droog" also had a number of 'firsts' to his credit. He was the first man to captain three All-Ireland winning He had the rare distinction of never teams. having played on a losing All-Ireland side. 'Droog' also was the first man to captain a fifteen-a-side team to ultimate victory. He also captained the county team to its Railway Shield success in 1908.

Although playing full-back for Mooncoin, he filled the centre-back position on the county side, and figured in many of the classics during that first decade of the century that lifted the game of hurling on to a new plane.

Our hurling glory was written in the days of 'Droog' and his colleagues. For as long as small boys and young men put caman to leather, his name will be synonymous with greatness and an inspiration to the players of each new age. But, being the man that he was, 'Droog' wore his laurels lightly. He was one who put his faith in the youth of his day, and judging by recent underage displays, the youth of today offer bright hopes of greatness coming again to the old hurling parish that he loved.

'Droog' died in his eightieth year having lived for a number of years in Mooncoin Village. He lies at rest now in a quiet part of sun-kissed Carrigeen churchyard, among his own. In spirit now he still stands there upon his native sward, and his gaze cherishes each road and boreen, every hill and hollow, each field and building, and every woman and child in "The Home of Hurling"
